Curzon Blames U. S. A.

Foreign Secretary Says America Responsible for Hold Up--Welsh Steel Strike Settled -- Sims Hammering Secretary Daniels--Damascus Has Political Crisis--British Labor Party Withdraws From Coalition.

AMERICA TO BLAME.
LONDON, Mar. 11. Blame for the troubles that are being experienced in settlement of the Turkish problem were laid at the door of the United States by Earl Curzon, Foreign Secretary, in explaining the Peace Conference's negotiations to the House of Lords to-day. Difficulty in framing the treaty is largely due to delay, and America is responsible for the delay, Lord Curzon said. The Foreign Secretary added that when the Peace Conference hoped that when the new States were set up in Asia Minor, however, that the United States would help materially in assisting New Armenia.

SWANSEA STRIKE SETTLED.
SWANSEA, Mar. 11. The strike of Welsh steel workers, which has seriously crippled industry in Wales for more than a week, has been settled. It was announced that an agreement had been signed in London to-day for ending the strike, the men being advised to return to their work. Seventy thousand men were affected by the walkout.

PLAIN WORDS FROM ADMIRAL SIMS.
WASHINGTON, Mar. 11. Charges that the Atlantic Fleet was not kept in readiness for battle during the war, were added by Rear Admiral Sims to his arraignment of the

Navy Department policy, in testimony to-day before the Senate Investigating Committee. He told the Committee that frequent pleas for American warships were disregarded and months were lost in dispatching the squadron of battleships to join the British Grand Fleet. When the squadron, finally, was ordered abroad, he said, it was composed of four ships of different types, evidence that other ships to form a homogeneous unit were "not ready for sea." He read also a message from the Navy Department, showing that after four were selected it was necessary to dock them before they could proceed, causing a delay of another two or three weeks.

LABOUR'S FINAL WITHDRAWAL.
LONDON, Mar. 11. The Labor Party became entirely dissociated from movement in administrative work, with the resignation to-day of George J. Wardle, Parliamentary Secretary to the Ministry of Labour. Mr. Wardle announced that he retires because of ill-health.

CRISIS IN DAMASCUS.
LONDON, Mar. 11. Official advices state that the situation in Damascus is serious. Emir Feisal, son of King of Hedjaz, it is explained, has thought it advisable to summon a Syrian Congress, which is to declare complete independence

of the country and proclaim him the King. The Emir, it is stated, succeeded temporarily in forestalling such action, securing a postponement of the meeting of the Congress, which had been called for March 6th, but excitement is said to be so great that he probably will be compelled to accede to the demands.

THE LA HAVRE ABANDONED.
BOSTON, Mar. 11. The schooner La Have, of La Have, N.S., was abandoned late on yesterday, 750 miles east of New York, according to a wireless message intercepted early to-day from the steamer Adriatic. The crew was taken off by the Adriatic.

WHISTLING TO KEEP, ETC.
LONDON, Mar. 11. The special correspondent of the Daily Graphic says that the only way Scotland is likely to go dry is by Canada draining her of whiskey. According to the correspondent, Scottish distillers scoffed at the idea of prohibition in Scotland, adding: "Prohibition in Canada is a farce and we have a splendid market for more whiskey than we can spare."

MORE TROUBLE.
LONDON, Mar. 11. It was stated in the House of Commons to-day that the British Warship Steadfast, had been fired upon in the Black Sea by Greek guards, and struck by a sixty-pound shell. No details have yet been received of casualties or damage.

Municipal Council.

The City Council held its regular weekly session yesterday afternoon. The Mayor presided and all the Councillors were present. After the opening preliminaries of the meeting, the following matters were given attention:

Prior to the discussion of the regular programme, Councillor Morris offered a resolution of sympathy to the family of the late John Holden, one of the staff of the City Engineer's Department. Councillor Morris paid a great tribute to the character of Mr. Holden—"having been a most unassuming man, in his modesty lay his strength." Councillor Ayre seconded the motion, which was supported by Councillor Mullaly, and it was ordered that it be conveyed to the family of the late Mr. Holden that the Mayor and Councillors had the greatest respect for him, for his faithfulness to duty, and that his services would be missed very greatly.

Decided to advertise for a man for the City Engineer's Department, who has some knowledge of surveying and draughtsmanship. Preference to be given a man who has served in His Majesty's forces. Also decided to advertise for a man to act as impounder and to perform such other duties as may be required. Preference to be given a man who has served in H. M. Forces.

A notice of motion was given by Councillor Ayre, effective next week, relating to cab, cart and horse taxes.

A letter was read from the Colonial Secretary that the matter of the old railway property would be brought before the Executive Government.

W. W. Blackall wrote as to the complaint of W. S. Monroe, about the use of motors, etc., in the Vocational School at Forest Road. Copy of letter to be sent to Mr. Monroe.

A list of trees and prices from Mr. Canning was referred to the Park Committee.

Permission was given R. C. Hopkins to repair the house of Mrs. Gosse, New Gower St. and same order was made respecting house 56 Field St., provided water and sewerage were installed. Permission was also given A. Simmonds for an extension, Barnes' Road.

Decided to have the Government approached respecting the building of a new bridge, where Job's Bridge is at present situated. The conditions were shown by the Engineer to be bad.

Ordered the party blocking Thomas Street be prosecuted, and the owner of the building, Water and Buchanan Streets, be notified to remove obstructions. After passing the pay rolls and bills, the meeting adjourned.
