STAGE ARTISTES WORK FOR CINEMAS.

LONDON-Thousands of actors and actresses in England are out of work. The hot summer, the closing down recently of six London playhouses, and the exodus of the theatre-going public to the seashore have been the main factors. In their efforts to keep the wolf from the door, men and women of the histrionic art have accepted small parts in cinema productions. An endeavor is being made to relieve the situation by the formation of a kind of co-operative theatrical company for the benefit of the working actors and actresses. Those taking part receive \$15 a week. 
