

The Methodist Conference.

BRIEF SYNOPSIS OF THE PROCEEDINGS AT GRAND BANK.

The S.S. Glencoe arrived at Grand Bank with the Ministers and delegates to the Methodist Conference at 8.30 a.m. July 1st, and were received at the pier by the loyal and capable people of the town. Two of the Canadian visitors, Rev. Dr. H. H. Mount Allison Ladies College, and Rev. R. J. D. Simpson, Secretary-Treasurer of the Superannuation Fund, by request, addressed the Ministers and laymen on board the Glencoe at Argentia, and did not proceed to Grand Bank. Doctor H. H. Mount presented the advantages of the Methodist Church at Mount Allison and Rev. Mr. Simpson made known through information received at a conference last year in America that there was no church on this island making so much provision for the veteran ministers as is the Canadian Methodist Church.

The Ministerial Session of the Conference opened at 9 a.m. July 1st, with Rev. Dr. Fenwick, the President presiding. In the evening at 8 o'clock the evangelistic meeting under the chairmanship of Rev. Edwin Moore was held in Fraser Hall. The Sunday School Rally Service the afternoon with all the Sunday school scholars of the town gathered in large numbers and seated in the pews of the Church is not to be forgotten. The first speaker, Rev. O. Jackson, the Conference Sunday School Secretary, spoke of the interest and leading part taken by the school in the systematic training of the teacher studies. Rev. Mr. Jackson emphasized the urgency of training and informed teachers for the work of the Church as well as showing how other Churches in Canada and America are giving more attention to the training of religious leadership both for the Sunday School and the day school and playground. Rev. Arthur Mews, C.M.G., followed with an illustrated talk. The children were interested from beginning to the finish of a thirty minute address which the speaker with a little and attractive boat drew before

sons and likened the building of life unto the construction of the boat. The large Church for the Sunday evening service was filled again by the Grand Bank people, always regular attendants at all Church services. Rev. S. D. Chown, the General Superintendent of the Methodist Church of Canada, was the preacher and Rev. Reynolds White, B.A., and Rev. Roland E. Moore candidates for ordination. The charge was masterly and scholarly and in the style characteristic of that personality so universally revered and esteemed by all the people of Canada.

Professor Gifford, Ph. D., of Wesleyan Theological College, Montreal, left a lasting impression by the thought of his four lectures on "The Kingdom of God." Their influence cannot be measured as the inspiration of them from him direct to the

men going forth with a clearer understanding and an entirely new look into the mind of the Master.

Rev. Mr. Goodwin of the Department of Evangelism and Social Service, with his impressive speech and pleasing personality, placed the problems confronting the spiritual and social life of the Church in a manner that awakens all to the necessity of the leadership of the Church in this day and stimulates encouragement for all through his faith in the ability of the Church to triumph.

The W.M.S. delegation was presented to the Conference and received by Rev. Dr. Chown and President Morris. Mrs. (Rev.) House read the report in the absence of Mrs. Lindsay, the President, and made mention that Miss Harris, daughter of Rev. Harris of our Conference, had, during the past year finished her probation and gone to China, and that Miss Howse, daughter of Rev. and Mrs. Howse, was preparing and hoped to leave within two years for the foreign field. The W.M.S. is doing yeoman service for the Missionary cause of the Church and received a greater ambition for more service through the recent visit of Mrs. Laval, the Canadian President, at Gower Street. The unusual large attendance of ladies caused the General Superintendent to remark that it was the largest backing he had seen any delegation to have. The Conference passed a resolution memorializing the Government to nationalize the second Monday in November as Thanksgiving Day.

The Board of Governors of the Methodist College was elected and consisted of twenty Ministers and twenty Laymen. Charles P. Ayre, Esq., was elected President and John Leamon, Esq., Secretary. Joseph Peters, Treasurer.

The following were elected as delegates to the General Conference which meets at Toronto in September: Revs. W. J. Morris, L. Curtis, D.D., Extra Broughton, E. C. French, H. C. Coffin, S. Bennett; Reserves, Rev. M. Fenwick, D.D., T. B. Darby, M.A., Laymen, W. H. Peters, John Leamon, A. Vatcher, L. B. Clarke, A. Soper, H. N. Burt; Reserves, A. G. Hudson, A. Mews, C.M.G.

Rev. W. J. Morris was elected the beneficiary to the Macpherson bequest, which finances a trip to Palestine. The laymen of the Conference offered to publish the Minutes of Conference and assume all the financial obligations. A resolution welcoming a unification of our day school system was passed by the Conference.

The Conference approved sympathetically any plans of University federation of Maritime Universities that would tend to increase the efficiency of educational institutions concerned.

Rev. R. H. Mercer was elected Business Manager of the Methodist Greeting and Rev. J. G. Joyce Assistant Editor.

The Ministerial and Lay delegates of the Conference were entertained at a banquet in Fraser Hall, Wednesday evening by the ladies of the town in their own delightful and charming style.

STAGE ARTISTES WORK FOR CINEMAS.

LONDON—Thousands of actors and actresses in England are out of work. The hot summer, the closing down recently of six London playhouses, and the reduction of the theatre-going public to the theatre have been the main factors. In their efforts to keep the wolf from the door, men and women of the histrionic art have accepted small parts in cinema productions. An endeavor is being made to relieve the situation by the formation of a kind of co-operative theatrical company for the benefit of the working actors and actresses. Those taking part receive \$15 a week. "East Lynne" was the first play given, but after a four-weeks' season it was found that the company had lost \$250, after paying artists' salaries, so the venture went on the shoals.

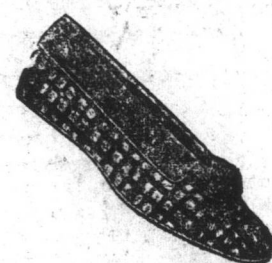

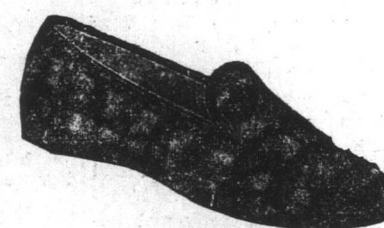
