## France Assumes Aggressive Attitude.

Invasion of Germany Becomes a Reality -- Penalties Imposed For Default -- Hollywood Again the Scene of a Tragedy -- Actor and Physician Arrested.

**FRANCE ASSUMES OFFENSIVE.**  
DUSSELDORF, Jan. 19. — France is engaged in fighting its classic battle of the Marne along the Rhine. Suddenly assuming the offensive on the defensive for more than a week, France tonight has taken the initiative in financial and economic matters and the French Mission in Berlin has been ordered to leave the entire front. Seven arrests, including the Rhinefeld penitentiary, the requisitioning of thousands of tons of coal, the closing of the Reichsbank, and the closing of the Reichsbank, tomorrow a half day's shut down, and the closing of the railway men to strike tomorrow, as they had been ordered to do by the Berlin Government, are the day's successes which French communiques might record tomorrow.

**BANKS CLOSE.**  
DUSSELDORF, Jan. 19. — All banking institutions in Düsseldorf, both private and State, closed their doors to-day, claiming they are unable to carry on business owing to the seizure by the French of the local bank of the Reichsbank, thus cutting off the supply of marks.

**BRITAIN MUST WAIT.**  
WASHINGTON, Jan. 19. — High officials here entertain little hope of an early agreement with Britain over the funding of the German debt. They say the French occupation of the Ruhr, along with the developments on the Continent which may result in war, have nullified the European economic and financial conditions to such an extent that the British will feel impelled to wait and see how these developments affect their Budget.

MARION, Ill., Jan. 19. — All defendants in the Herrin riots have been acquitted.

**LODGE GEORGE'S CHOICE.**  
LONDON, Jan. 19. — The Daily News announces it has discovered that Lloyd George has nominated Lord Birkenhead leader of the Opposition in the Lords. Commenting thereon the News says: "The novel spectacle of this human embodiment of the concentrated essence of Toryism leading Liberals even of the mildest brand in the Lords will endanger the gravity of all parties in that solemn assembly. Lloyd George continues with curious stubbornness to pursue the phantom of a Centenary."

**RECOVERED.**  
ROME, Jan. 19. — Premier Mussolini has completely recovered from his recent attack of flu, and yesterday addressed the Chamber of Deputies, calling them "fellow citizens," as he drives his own car.

**A PUNISHMENT TO FIT THE CRIME.**  
QUEBEC, Jan. 19. — Canon Scott, in an interview yesterday, expressed his belief that hanging is the most practical means of putting an end to the traffic.

**MORE DIRECTORS REPEAT REFUSAL.**  
ESSEX, Jan. 19. — Five prominent mine directors appeared before the French authorities in Breda yesterday, and after a reiteration of their refusal to aid in the delivery of coal were advised to hold themselves ready to appear before a military court. A policeman was arrested yesterday for not saluting a French officer.

PARIS, Jan. 19. — The report is confirmed that Crown Prince Charles of Rumania, is about to apply for a divorce from Princess Helen, who is now with her mother, the former Queen of Greece, at Palermo.

SAN DIEGO, Jan. 19. — Rodger V. G. Clark, motion picture actor and Dr. L.L. Jacobs, civilian physician, at Camp Kearney, were arrested by Los Angeles police and held for investigation of the death of Miss Fritz Mann, a pretty dancer, whose partially clad body was found on the beach at Torrey Pines on Monday.

**Last Night's Hockey.**  
CHAMPION FELIDIAN TEAM IN HARD CONTEST WIN OVER TERRA NOVAS 3-2.

The second hockey match of the season was played at the Prince's Rink last night between the Felidians and Terra Novas and resulted in the champions winning out from their opponents by a one goal lead, in a game that sent some eighteen hundred fans highly pleased with the brand of hockey that was displayed. The ice was by no means to the players' liking, the surface being very uneven, as after the first period the puck became unmanageable and time after time, when good smart play was in evidence, the game was hampered somewhat, owing to the ice becoming soft and dull. Time and again the players on both sides displayed their wares by turning in many smart plays, only to overtake the rubber or lose it altogether in a depression. Nevertheless, the players, though handicapped in this respect, kept up practically the same pace all through, and although the ice became very heavy in the second period, flashes of fast work were evident.

His Excellency, Sir Wm. Allardice and Capt. Wilberforce-Bell, A.D.C., were present, and occupied seats in the director's box, and enjoyed every moment of the game. The Terra Novas threw a scare in the Felidian camp yesterday afternoon when it was learned that George Meadlin, the husky defence player of the Brigus team had arrived in the city, and would be in the Terra Novas line-up. George Jerrett of last year's Brigus team appeared with the Felidians, and proved a good substitute for the flying wing man in the attack, and many a time cleared the rubber out of the danger zone, when it looked almost impossible. We have witnessed brilliant goalkeeping, season after season, but the climax was reached in the game last night, when Brown, the Terra Novas' new net custodian, gave one of the finest exhibitions of goal tending ever seen in the country. At times he had the entire Felidian team completely baffled. Our Canadian friend received a hearty reception from the crowds on his clever play. Brown formerly played with the Crescents of Halifax, and although out of the game for some five years, he certainly has not forgotten his business. Jack Field, who made his first appearance for the Terra Novas last night, played a rattling good game. Capt. Canning for the Terra Novas is one of the best conditioned men in the game this season. "Jack" went the full route without a relief and played a good game; in the end to end runs and back checking being a feature of the game. The game was fast in the first period but slowed up in the second and third.

**1ST PERIOD.**  
It was not until the game had been under way twelve minutes that Duke Winter found the net for the Felidians, the shot was a wicked one from outside of the defence and sailed high in the corner of the net behind Brown. The Felidians pressed hard but Tobin and Parker on the Terra Novas defence, stopped the Blues aggregation time after time, and with the excellent goal tending of Brown, no further scoring resulted. The Terra Novas forward, made repeated calls on Hunt, but found him unobtainable. Meadlin was substituted for Tobin, and played a very good game on the defence, and also made several spectacular runs. The Terra Novas were pressing hard when the gong sounded. End of first period, Felidians 1 goal, Terra Novas 0.

**2ND PERIOD.**  
The second period saw both teams working hard, the Felidians with a one goal lead, appeared to have all they could do to keep up the pace, and call upon call was made upon Hunt by Field, Canning, Parker, and Tobin. It was not until five minutes of the period had elapsed when Ewins captured the rubber near the Western goal, and by clever stickhandling made a speedy dash east and shot from outside the Terra Novas defence, recording No. 2 for the Felidians. The Terra Novas were now working well and after several unsuccessful attempts, Canning on a pass from Clarke, scored the first goal for the Terra Novas eight minutes later. The game until the close of the period, showed some spectacular play. Rendell and Tait made some pretty runs, while Alderice and Jerrett got in some pretty work in the forward line. End of 2nd period, Felidians 2, Terra Novas 1.

**3RD PERIOD.**  
With the score 2 to 1 in the Felidians favor, the teams appeared on the ice in the last period amidst loud cheering. The supporters of both teams encouraged the players on, and much snappy play was in evidence.

The Felidians, through a combined effort availed of an opening two minutes after the period opened. When Parker lodged an easy one behind the Terra Novas' goalie. At the face of the orange and black aggregation put on more steam and made several onslaughts on their opponents goal. Field in the centre worked like a tri-jan, having sent Hunt several difficult shots, which he cleared safely. It was not until two minutes before the close of the game that Field found the net for the Terra Novas, scoring No. 2. With but short time to go, the Terra Novas kept well up in the attack, and were pressing the Felidians very hard. Just before the gong went Parker made a good run, but failed in his attempt to equalize. The game ended Felidians 3 goals; Terra Novas 2.

Several times during play last night a whistle was blown in the gallery, which corresponded in sound to that used by the referee, and which proved to be very annoying to the players. This whistle blower should be thrown out of the rink.

Mr. C. C. Robertson refereed the game to the entire satisfaction of all. Despite the notice that smoking is not permitted during the game, several "fans" still ignore the notices. The players again request their supporters not to smoke during the game. Monday night's game will see the Terra Novas and Guards try conclusions.

**Nazimova Favors Bobbed Hair Fad.**  
FAMOUS STAR IN FILM VERSION OF "A DOLL'S HOUSE" DEFENDS THE STYLE.

Nazimova, famous Russian star of the stage and the screen, and at her best as Nora in her own production of Ibsen's "A Doll's House," which she made for United Artists Corporation, was in anything but a good humor when she met interviewers at her Hollywood headquarters as she was putting the finishing touches on the widely known Ibsen classic.

"It is an outrage! As though the way a woman wears her hair has anything to do with her work or her character. It matters not one whit whether a woman wears her hair parted in the middle and draped over her ears; whether it be bobbed all over her head or hanging in a braid; whether her skirts are short and ruffy or she is clad in a tightly clinging gown. The girl rose-buds of to-day are the full-blooming woman-flowers of to-morrow, and the splendid glory of womanhood is never lost."

It might be added that this right of a woman to wear her hair as she sees fit is the dominant theme in "A Doll's House," which will be shown at the Majestic Theatre again to-day. This Ibsen drama argues that a woman has the right to develop her own personality and individuality.

**Count The Cost.**  
Sugar is nowadays the grocer's leader and is sold practically at cost, i.e. landed price plus grocer's percentage of handling expenses. Calculating handling expenses such as cost of weight, cost of bags, labor, etc., is usually guess work rather than figuring.

American and Canadian shopkeepers who have employed expert accountants to figure their costs are refusing to handle bulk Sugars and are dealing solely in package sugars; their argument is, "If we must follow the crowd and sell sugar at the cost, we shall sell only package sugars, the cost of which we know." If shopkeepers who prefer to retail sugar out of a barrel, knew the cost of such procedure, they would gladly pay 75 cents per 100 lbs. over the bulk price for package sugars.
