To those splendid words the governing body would only add this. They must record another C.L.B. hero. In August, H.M.S. Raleigh was wrecked off the coast of Labrador. Henry Bashford, a first-class stoker, volunteered to swim ashore with a line to save his shipmates. He perished in the attempt but the splendour of his self-sacrifice remains. He was only twenty-one, and had but recently left his platoon, St. Mark's, South Norwood,
