## WINNIPEG FOOTBALL MEN CLIP TAIL OFF AMATEUR DEFINITION

The Winnipeg and District Football Association, at the third session of its annual meeting, held in the Industrial Bureau last night, decided to modify the clause relating to amateur standing. The clause before alteration read: "That all players shall be of amateur standing as defined by the Manitoba Amateur Athletic Association." The clause as amended cuts off the last clause and reads: "That all players shall be of amateur standing."

The significance of this change is a matter of divided opinion, but the fact that the meeting did not go farther and rule to play under old country rules pure and simple, after despatching the game regulations defined by the Canadian Amateur organization, indicates that the matter still moves in doubt. Future action in this regard is to be decided later.

**Went on M. A. A. Action.**

The main argument centered round the demand of some delegates that the amateur body be given a chance to make whatever concessions it deemed advisable. It was largely owing to this that the members decided to wait and not to accept the British definition of amateur status.

Tom Baxter, one of the old leading lights of Winnipeg football, advised care before deciding on any course. He pointed out that the amateur body had adopted a conciliatory attitude and that more than Winnipeg clubs were involved, namely letters in the province. The Sam Davidson stated that the Manitoba football organization would follow the lead of the Winnipeg league. He thought it was time for the Winnipeg body to show that they meant business and would not stand to have the question shelved again as in the past.

**Lost on Vote.**

A vote was taken on the subject by a vote of 11 to 11 it was decided to postpone action and the league, while still in affiliation with the amateur body, is now compelled to play according to its rules.

Other matters pertaining to the league, including the question of when the international games should be played, were disposed of at the meeting. It was decided that owing to the fact that heretofore this series had been begun late in the season, when the interest in the game was waning, the first international match should be pulled off not later than the first Saturday in July and a prize should be given to the winners of the series.

**\$5 Forfeit Fee.**

It was also decided that a fee of \$5 be required from each team entering in the league, which should go as a forfeit in the event of the team not finishing the league fixtures.

On behalf of the league, the committee recommended that each team in the league should enter and take part in the competition for the cup which has been presented by the Trades and Labor Council, and for the final game will be played at the Trades and Labor athletic meet on Labor Day each year.

The committee also recommended that District rules and in all probability most of the league teams will compete.

**New Clubs in League.**

Three new clubs, the Sussex Old Boys, St. Albans and Seven Oaks, all intermediate, entered the league last night, making in all 28 entries, an increase of five teams over last year. Of these the following six will play senior football: North West Wanderers, Celtics, Brits, United Westons, Beavers and Scottish.

## ASTON VILLA WINS ENGLISH CUP

London, April 19.—The final game for the English Football Association cup opened at the Crystal Palace today before a large crowd. Aston Villa, who had won the cup in 1900, defeated Liverpool 3-1. The game was brilliant from the start, with the Villa men aggressive, but Liverpool's goalkeeper proved impregnable, until Hampton netted a goal for Aston, which was the signal for a tremendous burst of cheering. ## HARLEM TOMMY MURPHY DECISIVELY BEATS WOLGAST

San Francisco, April 18.—For sixteen rounds "Harlem Tommy" Murphy of New York and Ad. Wolgast of Boston fought a sensational and exciting battle today, with little to choose between them. Tom Wolgast missed a right swing and saved the way for a high and decisive victory for Murphy.

Incidentally it served to bring the Harlem fighter to the front ranks as a lightweight champion's contender after thirteen years of effort. In the seventeenth round, Wolgast sent a terrible right swing to his opponent's jaw. It fell short and the champion spun around like a top and all but fell to the floor. Murphy then smashed the spinning Wolgast's face until the blood sprang in every direction. Wolgast yelled like a madman and slumped and clung to the ropes of the fight to avoid a knockout.

In the eighteenth round Wolgast received the beating of his life. He was hit on the forehead with a long ring car. He opened with a rush but a straight right caught him on the chin and stopped him. Murphy fairly smothered his opponent in this round with cutting half arm jabs to the face and it required the services of Wolgast's entire retinue of seconds to keep him from being knocked out. He was hit on the nose and he bled freely. The nineteenth and twentieth rounds found Murphy beating a ceaseless tattoo on his almost helpless antagonist's body and face, but the power to deliver a finishing punch was lacking and the New Yorker was compelled to be contented with a well earned decision in his favor.

Wolgast was a sorry sight as his seconds carried him from the ring. Prior to the seventeenth round the battle was almost a repetition of the previous meeting between the two, which ended in a draw. Wolgast landed frequently on the body and Murphy devoting himself to his rival's face and head. Wolgast's punches, most of which were delivered at close range, lacked force, however, and had little effect. Murphy declared he was fighting Willie Ritchie for the title at a moment's notice.

"Murphy is the toughest ever," was all Wolgast would say.

**Canadian Featherweight Won.**

New York, April 19.—Frankie Fleming, featherweight champion of Canada, knocked out Teddy Hubbs of Pittsburgh, in the ninth round of a scheduled 10-round bout here tonight. A right and left to the jaw ended the contest after Hubbs had twice taken the count of nine.
