PRIZE WINNERS SOUTH MALAHIDE SCHOOL FAIR

Large Crowd, Splendid Exhibits, Good Time, Features of Annual School Fair at Mt. Salem Last Week.

The annual school fair held by the South Malahide School Fair Association at Mt. Salem, on Wednesday of last week, was a success in every way. All South Malahide schools participated and the entries would do credit to the East Elgin County Fair. Great rivalry exists between the nine schools taking part and all events were keenly contested. These school fairs are held under the direction of the Ontario Department of Agriculture, and their success each year is due to the efforts of our agricultural representative, Mr. C. W. Buchanan, J. C. Smith, Inspector of public schools and the several teachers.

The exhibit of roots and vegetables showed the effects of the unfavorable season, but nevertheless,

were remarkably good. The domestic science exhibit was above the average and the cakes, etc., made by the little girls were wonderful. The judges in this department were Mrs. John Bray, Miss Mabel Bray, of Mapleton, and Mrs. Thomas Hammond, Aylmer. The nature study exhibit is also worthy of special mention.

Public speaking was one of the features of the fair and the five-minute addresses given by the youngsters, one from each school section, showed much training, and we doubt very much if many of the grown-ups present could have handled their subjects as well.

Possibly the prettiest spectacle of the day was the school parades and drills and the work of the youngsters of School Section No. 2, deserve special mention. Mrs. Ethel Irwin is the teacher and her class marched with the precision of veterans, keeping perfect time and going through their complicated exercises without hesitation or mistake of any kind.

The school and grounds were fittingly decorated for the occasion and the directors deserve much credit for their efforts in making the Fair such a success.
