**THE WEATHER PROPHECY.**

Toronto, Dec. 26-11 a.m.—The disturbance  
which covered Tennessee last night is now  
over the New England coast as a severe storm,  
and the other disturbance mentioned covers  
Lake Superior. Snow has fallen in the southern  
portion of the lake region, and it is now snow-  
ing heavily at St. Lawrence. A fall of  
snow has also occurred in Manitoba. Min-  
imum temperature: Calgary, 5°; Winnipeg, 5°;  
Toronto, 15°; Rockville, 25° below; Montreal, 17°  
below; Quebec, 15° below; Halifax, 4° below.  
Signals will be continued at ocean ports.

region covering the peninsula and as far  
east as Belleville are: Strong winds and
