London's Delegation Urging the Trunk Sewer and Port Stanley Improvement Projects.

The Retaliation Contract Labor Bill

OTTAWA, Thursday, March 13. The corridors are filled to-day with deputations. There are three railway schemes on the tapis, and large deputations are here urging the Government to give them subsidies. The Nippissing and James Bay Railway has the largest following, including Mayor Clarke and Alds. Swait, Gillespie, Booth and Shaw, of Toronto; Messrs. D. N. Alexander, G. W. Rose, Robt. Jaffery and A. A. Allan representing the Toronto Board of Trade; Ald. Carscallen, Ald. Pratt and Ald. Mc-Bride, of Hamilton, F. C. Bruce, R. Skinner,

Bride, of Hamilton, F. C. Bruce, R. Skinner, C. G. Smith, representing Hamilton Board of Trade; and Messrs. W. B. McMurrich, Wm. Hendrie, Alex.—Noimance, C. J. Campbell representing the company. They will ask for a grant of \$12,000 per mile for their road. A large number or Victorians are similarly backing up the Lindsay, Bobcaygeon and Pontypool Railway, and the extension of the Midland Railway from Haliburton to Mattawa.

The House then took up Mr. Taylor's bill copying the American statute prohibiting the importation of laborers under contract. He submitted petitions from many labor organizations in favor of the measure. The Speaker put the motion for second reading and declared it carried.

Mr. Mitchell objected and demanded to know whether the Government did not intend to announce itself upon this grave international question.

Sir John Macdonald said the motion had been declared carried before he had a chance to speak. He declared his opinion that this bill should not be adopted. The legislation on the other side, though its operation was prejudicial to Canadian interests, had not been conceived in a spirit hostile to this country, and Canada should not imitate that measure. There was no need for it. The United States had enough population without calling for immigrants, but in Canada there was need for a great population to fill up the vacant land in the Northwest. But while he did not wish to see the bill passed, he believed it should be read the second time pro forma, and referred to a special committee.

Mr. Davies expressed his dissent. The second reading of the bill would be taken in the United States as affirming the principle of the bill, and just at this time, when negotiations were in progress for the settlement of international differences, such a course would be suicidal. What was wanted was negotiation and not measures which would tend to create ill-feeling.

Mr. Wilson (Elgin) contended that the Government should on its responsibility either accept or reject this measure. There might be reasons why it should be passed. It was well enough to say that the United States meant nothing unfriendly by this bill, but if they did not mean to do Canada injury by it they had had plenty of time to repeal it. The Premier said the Canadian labor market required a large supply. But if this bill was not to pass it was absurd to give it a second reading. Either it ought to pass and be placed upon the statute book, or else it ought to be rejected at once.

Some further discussion ensued, when the Premier cried "carried" and the motion was adopted.

Sir R. Cartwright intimated that when the House goes into Committee of Supply, he would have a motion to make, but declined to indicate its nature.

The House adjourned at 11:30.
