FINE AND WARM — THUNDER SHOWERS IN SOME PLACES.

Toronto, May 5.—11 p.m.—Since Friday night the western storm has moved northward across Manitoba, and there has been a very decided increase of pressure over New England and the Maritime Provinces. The weather has been cool in Eastern Canada, and unusually warm in the lake region. Heavy showers have occurred in Manitoba. Minimum and maximum temperatures: Calgary, 38—60; Qu'Appelle, 46—68; Winnipeg, 54—76; Parry Sound, 60—88; Toronto, 52—94; Montreal, 44—80; Quebec, 38—56; Halifax, 36—46.
Toronto, May 6.—1 a.m.—Probabilities for the next 24 hours for the lower lake region (covering the peninsula and as far east as Belleville) are: Moderate southeast to southwest winds; generally fine and warm, with thunder showers in a few places.

—Samuel Perkins was allowed to go on suspended sentence on Saturday night by Squire R. F. Lacey. Perkins was charged with disorderly conduct in London West.

—Miss Emma Hall, of the Toronto Training School for Nurses, who was home having completed her course and taken a very high standing at the examinations.

—Patrick Thomas and James Birchman were arrested on Saturday by Detectives Graham and Jeffries while trespassing on the C. P. R. They were fined \$5 or twenty days and Birchman \$4 or ten days. Both went down.

—Rev. Herbert G. Miller, M.A., has resigned his position as principal of Huron College in this city. It is probable that Mr. Miller will return to the active service of the Church of England in England, and will leave for the old country early in July.

—Col. Lindsay has received definite information that the Thirteenth Battalion, of Hamilton, will come to Hamilton on Saturday morning. The former celebration. The band will give a concert while here, and the reputation of the Thirteenth's musicians is a guarantee for a rich musical treat.

—Londoners had a touch of midsummer weather yesterday. The heat was more aggravating because it was 83 in the shade at 2 p.m. at the office of the local observer and 114 in the sun. Saturday's maximum temperature, in the shade, was 86. Winter fannels got the cold shake yesterday; the former wearers will get theirs when the first cold spell comes.

—Mr. and Mrs. Josiah Gould, of 226 Wellington street, have the sympathy of many acquaintances on account of the loss of their only son, Wesley Richard, aged 15 years and 5 months, who died on Saturday morning. The little boy was brighter than the average child of that age, and during his two weeks' illness exhibited a wonderful degree of patience. He caught a cold, which developed into pneumonia, and died about the heart and caused his death.

—The Thirteenth Battalion of Hamilton will go to London on the Queen's Birthday. The trip will be made by the T. H. and B. and this will be the first passenger train run out of Hamilton on this road. The Dufferin Rifles will join the Thirteenth Battalion in Brantford, and the trip is expected to be very pleasant. It is stated that the train will leave Brantford about 7:30 o'clock.—Brantford Examiner.

—There's a local application in this from the Hamilton Times: "Toronto health record shows that of 173 cases of diphtheria reported, 112 are in houses situated on block paved streets. In the west end of the city before the blocking of the streets diphtheria was almost unknown. There may not be the relation of cause and effect between the cedar blocks and the disease, but porous wood soaked with filth and exposed to the hot sun and rain cannot but be open to grave suspicion."

THE ELECTRIC RAILWAY.

It is possible to judge of the volume of the matter contained in the electric street railway agreement when it is known that it takes over two hours' steady and rapid reading to go through the agreement once. The matter was up before a special meeting of No. 1 committee on Saturday night. There were present: Ald. Jones (chairman), O. E. Brenner, George W. Armstrong, Robert Carrothers, J. W. McCallum, Henry Dreaney, Mayor Little, T. G. Meredith, city solicitor; C. H. Ivey, railway solicitor; Manager Chicago; Treasurer Pope. The chairman read the agreement through, which occupied the two hours mentioned. Then the committee discussed some of the most important clauses in the by-laws, and decided to send it to the council for its first reading on Monday night. The city solicitor pointed out the different clauses where the sub-committee and the company had failed to agree. It was decided to meet again this afternoon at 4 o'clock, and still further discuss the points of difference. There are four of these, and while they are material, they are hardly important enough to hinder the passage of the franchise.
