KATIE TOUGH'S DEATH

The Young Woman's Life Lately Insured for a Considerable Amount.

Toronto, Ont., March 13.—An incident came to light last night which may have an important bearing on the Gravelly poisoning case. It has been discovered that three weeks ago a policy for \$3,000 in the Provincial Provident Institution, of St. Thomas, had been placed on the life of the deceased Katie Tough, or Kate Hammond, payable in favor of her husband, while another for an unknown amount had been taken out in Buffalo at the time of their secret marriage there under the name of James, three months ago.

FROZEN AT HIS HEARTH.

Roscommon, Mich., March 13.—James Hyslop, an aged farmer, who lived alone on the west side of Higgins Lake, was on Wednesday found frozen stiff, sitting by a fireless hearth. He was a very eccentric man, and came originally from Scotland.

SHENANGO STILL SAFE.

St. Thomas, March 13.—The rescuers were unable to reach Shenango No. 1, as reported, not being able to get nearer than five miles to her. She is fifteen miles off Long Point, in a startling ice floe, and is apparently all right, although the supply of provisions must be getting short, if it is not exhausted.

BLAZE IN DETROIT.

Detroit, Mich., March 13.—Fire started from the crossing of electric light wires in the top floor of the Wayne County Savings Bank building shortly before 11 last night. At 12:30 this morning the flames were still raging, but the firemen had succeeded in confining them to the third and fourth floors occupied by the Masonic bodies of the city. Monroe Chapter was holding a session when the fire started, but all the members got out safely. The Detroit Commandery loses all of its uniforms and elegant furniture. The loss will be heavy.

SONS OF ENGLAND.

No Report on the School Question—Election Officers—Branford to be the Next Place of Meeting.

Peterborough, Ont., March 13.—The Supreme Grand Lodge of the Sons of England did not reach the end of their business last night, as was expected, and will continue today.

The committee's report in regard to the Manitoba school question memorial has not made its appearance yet, and it is reported that there will be no report.

The important business yesterday was the election of officers. The result was as follows: Supreme grand president, Mr. John W. London, of Belleville (acclamation); supreme grand vice-president, Mr. C. Barlow, Cumberland, Toronto. There were four nominations for this office, and Mr. Cumberland was the choice on the second ballot. Supreme grand secretary, Mr. J. W. Carter, Toronto; supreme grand treasurer, Mr. Benjamin Finchcliffe, Toronto; auditors, Messrs. Geo. Clay and Henry Furze; deputy supreme grand president for South Africa, Mr. T. N. Dyer, of King Williamstown.

This was all the business before the morning session, except the presentation of several notices of motion and the nomination of candidates for the general purpose committee.

At the afternoon session the election of the general purpose committee was proceeded with, forty nominations being made. The election resulted in the following selection: Dr. John S. Reynolds, Ottawa; Sam Hines, Toronto; W. H. Clay, Toronto.

The board of management was chosen as follows: Messrs. T. R. Skippon, Dr. Hodgetts, R. Patching, G. Clatworthy, W. H. Clay, S. W. Burns, W. G. Blundell, T. Cannon, J. C. Swale, Dr. W. R. Wallers, A. Ridderford, H. A. Seaton, J. J. Pritchard, and C. H. Cotton.

Chicago, March 13.—"I cannot understand the reason. From their appearance it looks as if I would be blind before I die." Such was the remark of Dr. A. V. Burgbill, 447 Cleveland avenue, addressed to his landlady Wednesday afternoon, after making his horoscope, and the prediction was verified by a terrible explosion last evening, in which he lost both of his eyes, and both of his hands were so mutilated that they will have to be amputated. The accident occurred in the office of Dr. W. C. Linquist, No. 80 Hill street, where Dr. Burgbill was experimenting with explosives with which he was endeavoring to compound a preparation for taking flashlight photographs. It completely wrecked the office of Dr. Linquist, and the detonation could be heard a half-mile away.

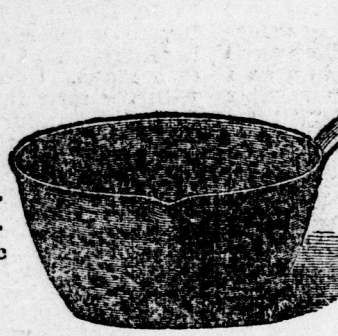
