THE COLD WAVE

Covers Most of the Lake Region and is Ex-

tending Eastward—Blizzard at the Soo.

BLIZZARD AT THE SOO.

Sault Ste. Marie, Mich., Jan. 2.—One

of the fiercest blizzards in years raged

here all day. The wind had a 50-mile

gale from the northwest and piled up

huge drifts of snow everywhere. The

mercury is dropping rapidly tonight.

Washington, Jan. 2.—Weather condi-

tions and general forecast: The storm

center noted Thursday morning over

Northern Lake Superior has continued

its rapid eastward movement and is

central this morning over the Upper St.

Lawrence Valley. It has been attend-

ed by quite general though light snows

from the lake region, and Upper Ohio

Valley eastward, and closely followed

by a cold wave which covers the

greater portion of the lake region; the

Upper Missouri Valley and the North-

western States. The Middle Atlantic

States the temperatures have risen.

The cold wave will extend eastward to

night through the lower lake region

and Middle Atlantic States, and the

temperatures will fall generally, though

not decidedly, in the south. It will

be still lower in the Ohio Valley, with

minimum temperatures in the neigh-

borhood of 8 degrees. There will be no

precipitation of consequence.

Storm warnings are displayed on the

Atlantic coast from Delaware Break-

water to Eastport, and cold wave

warnings in New York, New Jersey,

Eastern Pennsylvania, Delaware, Dis-
