Increase by Royal Arcanum Strongly Defended.

FOR 36 YEARS

Howard A. Cleveland Sentenced to Death in 1869 Dies in Prison.

Orrington, Me., Aug. 2. - Howard A.

Cleveland is dead at the state prison at Thomaston after having been confined there since 1869 under sentence of death. For some reason never explained the sentence was not carried out, nor was annulled or modified. It seems to have been forgotten and Cleveland lived on until he died a natural death. The case was one of the most remark. able in this state. It was the only murder ever committed in Orrington. records show that Cleveland was indicted for the willful and malicious that the liability of death increases as age advances, and as long as that is guilty was rendered in 1869. Cleveland was sentenced to death. Before fixing the day for the execution the governo question to the supreme court clared Cleveland guilty of the crime whereof he stood indicted.
