THE KINGSTON CALAMITY.

The year 1906 saw the partial destruction of the cities of San Francisco and Valparaiso by earthquake, and the devastation of several cities and towns and a wide tract of fertile country, by the eruption of Vesuvius. The present year has opened ominously with another of those appalling catastrophes. in which nature appears to strike with blind rage at man and his handiwork. The West Indies have been scourged beyond other divisions of the earth's surface. Volcanic in their origin, they are lids of granite and limestone over the elemental fires. They are the habitat of the hurricane, and its sport and prey. A few years ago it spread havoc over the plantations of Jamaica, and the sugar and fruit growers were only saved from total ruin by the charity of the Imperial Government.
