

HANDS MOROCCO

Be Occupied By Troops.

Tangier, Oct. 15 .- Judging from the latest semi-official declarations here, Sultan Abd-el-Aziz, during the conferences with the French minister, invited France to consider the question of establishing a protectorate over Morocco, including the immediate occupation of the entire coast.

The most disquieting feature of the reported request of the Sultan that the Porte be occupied by France's troops, is the practical certainty that an attempt is now imminent to post foreign military police upon the various seaboard of Morocco, which is believed will meet with flerce resistance on the part of the natives.
