U. S. TARIFF BILL

Province Will Allow No More Wood Pulp Exported.

Montreal, Sept. 13.-The Province of Quebec has definitely decided to prohibit the exportation of pulpwood, cut from crown lands. In September, 1900, the Premier of the province made a promise that the stumpage rates of 60 cents per cord on wood cut from crown lands would not be raised for a period of ten years. It is intended to carry out that pledge and no increase in stumpage charges will be nade until September, 1910.

The Canadian paper makers are urging the provincial authorities to stop the exportation of pulpwood cut from crown lands, but the American owners of rights to cut timber on more than 12,000 square miles of those lands represent that the pledge of September 1900, implied a right of importation for ten years, and that in good faith no prohibition should be made until the lapse of that period.




