THE FIRST DIVISION IN THE COMMONS

Measure to Restrict Appeals to
the Supreme Court Defeated
in House.

Ottawa, Nov. 25.—Mr. Lancaster's
bill to amend the railway act came up
for second reading today. The first of
these proposals to make clear that the
railway commission and it alone shall
have the right to adjudicate as to the
kind of contract to be made between
railways and shippers.

To illustrate his meaning he speci-
fied the case of a man who had shipped
a consignment of horses valued at \$16,-
000. The railway refused to accept
them unless the value of only \$1,200.
The shipper had to accept this. The
horses were destroyed in transit and
the shipper could only collect damages
on the \$1,200. He sued for the larger
amount, but the Ontario court of ap-
peal held that the form of contract
was sufficiently like the authorized con-
tract to be legal. The point involved
is the practice of parties contracting
out of damages in return for a lower
rate. Mr. Lancaster seeks to obtain for
the shipper power to choose whether
he can pay the higher rate and have
full recourse for damages in case of
loss, or the lower rate for partial lia-
bility. The member for Lincoln wants
the railway commission to be the only
court which can pass on such matters.
Hon. Mr. Graham consented to the
second reading.

The second bill is intended to reduce
the number of appeals from the railway
commission to the supreme court. It
would restrict the time within which
appeals can be taken to one month,
and also confine appeals to doubtful
questions of law.

Hon. A. B. Aylesworth was unfavor-
able to the bill, and entered into a dis-
cussion upon the general question of
appeals. He did not think that the
judgment of lawyers would support
anything approaching the abolition of
the supreme court. He admitted that
appeals gave a great advantage to the
wealthy, but he was not sure that that
advantage should be taken away. The
bill was sent to the railway committee.

Mr. Lancaster's third bill was thrown
out after a vote had been taken.—The
first of the session. The Government
mustered 57, and the Opposition 55,
giving a majority of 24. This bill sought
to free municipalities from paying any
level crossings unless there was an
agreement between the company and
the corporation approved of by the
railway board.

Mr. Graham's chief argument against
the bill was that the present act, which
was passed last year, should be given
a chance to work out.

PARKS COMMISSIONER STRONGLY RECOMMENDED

City Engineer Graydon Believes
a Man Should be Appointed
to Trim Trees on Streets.

City Engineer Graydon, at the meet-
ing of the board of works last even-
ing, recommended the appointment of
a parks commissioner to take charge
of the trimming of trees for fur-
hydro-electric wires. He pointed out
that it would take a commissioner
two months to trim the trees for the
city line and also the London Electric.
The expense, of course, should be
charged up to the hydro-electric and
the London Electric Company.

"I thought that at the last meeting
of the committee we moved that you
name a man," said Ald. Saunders.
"No, you did not," answered Mr.
Graydon. "I want to do was to re-
port, and I have done so."
"We had better send the communi-
cation to the council," said Ald. Rose.
"We must care to act on it tonight."
He moved to that effect, and it was
carried.

Mr. Graydon's Letter.

Mr. Graydon's report was as follows:
Nov. 25, 1909.
Chairman and Members of No. 2 Com-
mittee:

Dear Sirs,—In reference to the trim-
ming of trees on the city streets by
the erection of the hydro-
electric poles, I would recommend that
you appoint a thoroughly capable man,
well skilled in such work to take
charge of it.

The hydro-electric poles on some
streets are on the same line as the
London Electric poles, and on other
streets are on a different but parallel
line. The first-named poles are about
10 feet shorter than the latter, and
therefore, the trees will have to be
trimmed both below and above for
both lines; and on such streets that
the hydro-electric poles are close to
the city line and the London Electric
poles further back, the line of the
trees near the street will all have to
be cut back for the hydro-electric
wires and cut on top for the London
Electric wires.

I foresee that when this work is
commenced you will have grave pro-
tests, and, doubtless, much litigation
from the property owners throughout
nearly the entire city, as it appears to
me that a vast number of the trees
will be ruined in appearance at least,
if not altogether, when they are trim-
med to give clearance to all these
wires, and it is for this reason, you
should select a man well versed in for-
estry and possessing tact and diplo-
macy to take charge of the work, as
he might be able to save many trees
and trim to the greatest advantage
and least possible injury to the trees
and detract to their appearance.

This work will involve a large ex-
penditure which must be borne by the
hydro-electric department, as No. 2
committee have no money for such
work. It will require, at least a su-
perintendent, two men and a team
steadily for some three or four months
to get over the city. The London Elec-
tric Company should pay for any trim-
ming done in connection with their
wires.

I believe that the appointment of a
parks, competent man such as the
late Mr. Pearce, would be in the best
interests of the city, as there is lot
of work for him all the year around.
The work the late Mr. Pearce per-
formed during his short tenure of of-
fice did much to improve in many re-
spects. I am, your obedient servant.

**GREAT INCREASE IN
NATURALIZED ALIENS**

Number in the Northwest More Than
Doubles Previous Year.

Ottawa, Nov. 25.—The report of the
secretary of state for the last fiscal
year was tabled in the House of Com-
mons today. It says that the number
of charters issued under the com-
panies act during 1908 and 1909 was
298. The total capitalization of new
companies for 1908 was \$1,293,-
875, and the capitalization of existing
companies was increased by \$72,293,-
000, which is more than double that
of the largest previous year and with-
in some eleven millions of the addi-
tional capitalization of old com-
panies in the last nine years from 1900,
which amounted to \$181,617,875,
which is only exceeded by that of the
year 1906.

The report states that the number of
naturalized aliens mostly in the farm-
ing section of the country was
more than double that of the previous
year, whilst the record of cases re-
admission to British nationality indicates
a fresh activity in the field of re-
naturalization.

During the year 1908, 25,731 persons

were naturalized. Of these 715 were re-
admitted to British nationality. Of
those naturalized last year 9,999 were
from the United States, 2,962 from
Austria, 2,046 from Russia, 1,852 from
Italy, 1,083 from Galicia, 805 from Swe-
den, 520 from France, 550 from Hun-
gary, 585 from Germany, 444 from
Norway, 439 from Japan, 375 from
China, 328 from Finland, 318 from
Belgium, and 187 from Iceland. This
makes a grand total of 114,135 persons
registered as naturalized British sub-
jects in Canada.
