BOSS DIDN'T PAY THEM.

When John Smith hired James Sullivan and Edwin Ford to do a little job of work for him, he tacitly if not actually promised to pay them. When the work was done, however, the two men were unable to get their money, and as a result, Smith appeared in police court today to explain why he had not paid his workmen. He professed to be in that condition sometimes described as "stoney," and suggested that he could make good by instalments. The magistrate did not see it that way, and ordered him to pay the money owing, \$9 in the case of Sullivan, and \$45 in the case of Ford, within a week or take the consequences, which, his worship intimated, probably would be a term in jail.

Forgetful of his own name, Smith drank havoc with a man's constitution, but it is not often except in the advanced stages of alcoholism that it makes a man forget his own name. This was the case with Smith today when he appeared on a drunk charge, and asked if that were his real name, he frankly confessed that it was not, adding very ingenuously: "Did I give the name of Smith last night?" He was allowed to go with a warning.

UNBIDDEN AND UNWELCOME.

A smile went round the police court when John Smith pleaded drunkenness as an excuse, and an explanation of the fact that last night he was an unbidden guest in the stable of John Hughes. But for the fact that he had been drinking and was not aware exactly where he was, he declared, he would never have chosen that particular stable for a resting place.

Apparently Collins and Hughes have had dealings in the past, for the former accused the latter of "having it in for him," while the latter declared that he would not have Collins around his place at all.

"I wouldn't come near your place if I were sober," declared the confessed trespasser, and he was allowed to go on the understanding that the next time he forced his presence on his unwilling host he will "go down" for a month.

IN A NEAR-FIGHT.

With a name like that of a famous pugilist of the past, it is not surprising that he should want to fight. The calling of his name in the police court today caused a momentary sensation. He asked for a war-up on a charge that he had imbued not wisely but too well last night, but though they all admitted that a blow or two was struck, they denied the name of fighting. Nevertheless the magistrate imposed a fine of \$2 in each case as the alternative to a 5-days' visit.

BOY WOULD BE A SOLDIER.

Apparently fired with enthusiasm for the life of a soldier, the 11-year-old son of a man who appeared before the magistrate yesterday on a charge of contributing to his child's truancy, has attached himself without invitation to the military camp at Carleton Place, and, according to his father, has defied parental authority and put in all his time for the last week with the soldiers instead of going to school.

The father declared in court that the boy was absolutely beyond his control. When asked if he would undertake to have the youngster in court 10 to 12 o'clock, he confessed doubt of his ability to carry out such an assurance. When the magistrate threatened to have the boy arrested on a charge of truancy, he gave up, however, the father thought he might manage to comply with the court's order. In the meantime his own case will stand.

GERMAN RIPS NAME

OFF COURT PAPER

Witness in Nerlich Case Causes Sensation in Toronto.

[Special to The Advertiser.]

TORONTO, June 9.—A sensation was caused in the assize court this afternoon, where Emil Nerlich stands charged with committing high treason, when Arthur Zirzow, one of the principal defendants, who is confronted with a document bearing his signature, took the paper and started to tear it to pieces. His action was so quick that the judge succeeded in almost detaching it before he was stopped. As soon as he was noticed the military escort, sitting nearby, Crown Prosecutor Michel, and other officials rushed to the witness box. The paper was taken from him, but Zirzow did not speak. One of the torn pieces was pulled from his pocket by one of the soldiers.

"This paper was put in your hands and you tore your signature from it," said the crown prosecutor.

Mr. Helmut objected to the document being put in declaring that it was used to discredit Zirzow and not against his client.

Zirzow declared that he was forced to sign the statement in order to convict Mr. Nerlich of treason.

The statement in question was one taken at Stanley Barracks, but now he is confined at Fort Henry, Kingston.

Zirzow said he had been influenced in his statement by Sergeant Lees of Stanley Barracks, who could not remember the exact date, but knew the "influencing" took place in the city hall. The statements he made in the police court were no true. He did not know that he had been sworn.

FIVE DROWNED WHEN CAR

TAKES PLUNGE INTO RIVER

SASKATOON, June 9.—At Outlook this evening, Joseph H. Thompson, general merchant, of Ardath, his wife and two children, Margaret, aged 8, and Herbert, aged 4, and Mrs. Herbert Coleman, aged 4, were drowned. The party of five had reached the Saskatchewan River at Outlook in a motor car. The approach to the ferry had not been locked, and when the car struck it, it slid away. The car turned turtle and sank in twenty feet of water. The only body yet recovered is that of Mr. Thompson. Mrs. Coleman arrived from Toronto today. Her husband is at present in Edmonton. Mr. Thompson came West from Aurora, Ont., four years ago.

County Council

Session.

EQUALIZATION SCHEDULE

Committee's Recommendation

Is Adopted—Will Care

For Aged Londoner.

The Glies' bridge site question, which has been before the Middlesex County Council since 1888, was brought up again in the council Wednesday afternoon, when a strong deputa- tion from Caradoc Township spoke for the spot, which has become historic through its connection with arguments in the council for the building of a bridge there.

John Stuart moved and D. Gordon seconded that the bridge be built, and that tenders be received at the December session. Duncan Brody spoke for the deputa- tion, and declared that along a twelve-mile road, only one bridge crossed the river and that crossing at all other places must be made by fording. The bridge was started in 1888, but has not yet been completed. Twice the bridge has been washed away, but travelers are still fording the river at that spot, Mr. Stuart said, in reviewing the history of the agitation.

The House of the Government Committee recommended the payment of accounts aggregating \$1,312.00. Of this sum, \$800 was left over from the previous year's expenditure. The building of a new bridge was left in the hands of the officers of the house.

Office for High Constable.

High Constable Ben Waterworth will have a room in the court house for an office, if a recommendation to this effect made by the jail committee is passed by the council. The committee laid over the question of steam heating for the county buildings until December. Use of the court house for luncheon was refused.

The council will discuss later in the session a recommendation made yesterday by James L. Robson, that a rest day for the Government in its new legislation, regarding suburban highways, which goes into effect next year. The Government intends to designate as "suburban highways" all main roads from cities and towns for a distance of seven miles, and will pay 40 per cent of their construction and maintenance, the city and county to bear 30 per cent each. The motion was referred to the board of road directors.

The first report of the equalization committee recommended the following schedule, which the council adopted: Delaware, \$1,888,068; Caradoc, \$2,780,415; Lobo, \$2,561,813; London, \$5,544,906; Metcalfe, \$1,838,185; North, \$1,629,248; North Dorchester, \$2,576,470; Westminster, \$4,287,272; East Williams, \$1,440,440; West Williams, \$1,190,122; West Niagara, \$2,246,246; Strathroy, \$1,153,858; Glencoe, \$2,192,202; Newbury, \$75,802; Wardsville, \$60,190; Parkhill, \$373,664; Alisa Craig, \$161,728; Lucan, \$279,455; Biddulph, \$1,879,410; McMillan, \$2,877,850.

A special committee was appointed to arrange for the construction of Centre road bridge, and the committee will meet the Oxford County Council at the site of the bridge this afternoon.

No Aid From Fund.

George Gallagher, who is ill and has a son in the 3rd Battalion expeditionary force, has received no aid from the patriotic fund. His case was discussed at length, most of the councillors being of the opinion that Gallagher was deserving of all that it was in their power to do. The Home of Refuge Committee advised that Reeve J. E. Harrison of the Methodist Church at Tillsonburg be given power to order Gallagher's commitment to the House of Refuge.

An account of \$146.35 from the London and Middlesex Children's Aid Society was referred to the finance committee. J. E. Harrison moved that \$2,000 be granted to the society for the purpose of sending a child to Mill street. The matter was referred to the board of road directors.

BAPTIST CHURCHES SHOW

INCREASE IN MEMBERSHIP

FOREST, June 9.—The Baptist meetings on Wednesday commenced with a spiritual exposition by Rev. P. W. Philpott of Hamilton.

The moderator, D. H. Gillies, had charge of the meeting and called on Rev. James A. Boyd of London for the report of the committee on the state of religion, which showed the churches to be in a strong and encouraging condition.

The Baptists for the year numbered 212, and the total membership 4,083, an increase on last year. The sum of \$43,381.62 was raised for the work at home, and \$1,312.00 for the various benevolent objects at home and abroad. The work in
