

MORE SPEAKERS LEND THEIR AID FOR BIG CAMPAIGN

Fifty Will Give Addresses For the Welfare Fund Cause, Commencing Shortly.

WILL ATTEND MEETINGS

Besides Chairman E. J. Jenkins, Mrs. A. T. Edwards, Mrs. John Rose, A. R. Kennedy, A. R. Ford, Dr. H. W. Hill and John Elliott have been added to the committee of speakers for the United Welfare Fund, which is to be collected in the city-wide canvass March 31 and the following week.

Fifty or more well-qualified speakers are being selected from the citizens of London, who will be ready at all times to present briefly the Welfare Fund cause at the regular meetings of all social, educational, religious and other organizations during the remainder of the month, so far as arrangements can be made. This corps of speakers is being organized and directed by the committee named above.

Already these organizations are calling for speakers, and it is believed that all whose meetings occur during the rest of the month will wish to have the interest of their members freshened by the re-telling of the story of the fourteen vital community service agencies affiliated in the Welfare Fund.

No solicitation of money or pledges is to be made by these speakers. Education and information is the aim of the program. Every effort is being made to have London informed to the last citizen, so that when the final canvass is made all may give intelligently and in full loyalty to the community in whose life they share and whose benefits they enjoy.

POSITIONS AWAIT BRITISH IMMIGRANTS AT FOREST

Five immigrants from the British Isles passed through the city last night on their way to Forest, where farm positions awaited them. It was learned at the department of agriculture office today. Twenty-one men were placed on farms Thursday morning by John Farrell, of the immigration department, and five more who arrived on an afternoon train were quickly snapped up by farmers of the district. Mr. Farrell accompanied the Britishers to Forest last night.

FARMERS REPORT ROAD CONDITIONS IMPROVING

Farmers report the country roads in fair condition. The snow is almost gone and the fine weather is aiding the men haul out a few remaining loads of wood. Spring work on the land will not commence for three weeks. In the meantime farmers are making the usual preparations, looking after implements and machinery repairs and putting harness in shape. Farmers state that so far this spring a large amount of fertilizing has been done on the land.

COMMITTEE TO CONSIDER PROPOSED EXPENDITURES

Certain proposed expenditures, not yet incorporated in the estimates, will receive the consideration of the members of the juvenile court committee in special session Monday next.

The city council has incidentally set \$600 per annum as the annual rental for the court's rooms in the city hall. No doubt this will be one of the "extraordinary expenditures" to claim attention.

ALD. SMITH FAVORS GRANT OF \$55,000 TO UNIVERSITY

The city council should lead the way in the support of the University of Western Ontario, Ald. Edwin Smith urges, approving of the \$55,000 grant to that institution again this year. From present indications there seems no doubt but that this sum will be voted in the city hall with little or no opposition from any of the members.

TALLANT WILL SUGGEST SETTLEMENT OF ACCOUNT

D. J. Tallant, chairman of the housing commission, stated that at the next regular session of that body would move a resolution asking the solicitor, G. N. Weekes, to move for a settlement of the McBride account of \$2,000. The commission had refused to pay this money, but until an order is secured from the court, the money is practically tied up.

LEAGUE ISSUES APPEAL FOR STARVING ALBANIA

British Government Is Giving \$5,000—United States Will Be Asked.

Associated Press Despatch. Geneva, March 14.—After appropriating 50,000 Swiss francs out of the League of Nations funds for the cause, the league council has issued a world-wide appeal for aid for the 200,000 persons starving in northern and Eastern Albania.

Lord Parmoor today said the situation was so terrible that quick relief was vital. The British government is giving \$5,000, the vatican 50,000 lire, and the United States will be asked to contribute.

FREIGHT TRAIN IS HALTED WHEN TRUCKS DERAILED

The London auxiliary of the C. N. R. was called out this morning shortly after ten o'clock to Longwood where a freight train travelling towards London was halted when the trucks on one of the cars were derailed.

Little damage was done and running of trains was not interfered with.

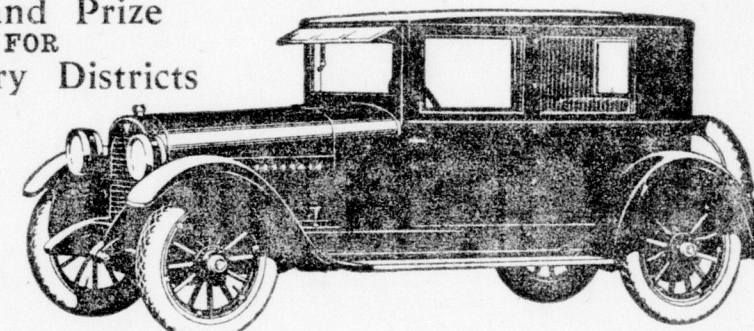

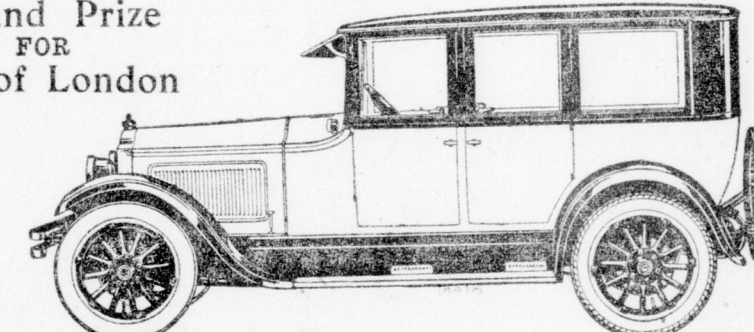
