Quaint Little Restaurant In New York Is Popular

Russian Notables Make Up Staff of Waiters and Entertainers.

PATRONS SING TOO

New York, April 6.—Most of the restaurants where one goes for supper after the play are very much alike, with but little difference in decoration and music. There are one or two places, however, that have a distinct atmosphere of their own. One I am thinking of particularly is run by a Russian, but curiously enough, backed by the money of two boys lately graduated from Harvard. It is a funny little place with very little room to dance, not particularly good pictures on the walls, but a place to which every one wishes to return. The little Russian who runs the restaurant has a very interesting personality and one can see his influence not only on all his employees but on his patrons as well.

I must frankly confess to being not in the least interested in the dukes and duchesses of Russia who are living in Paris by getting meals from their rich friends, but I am very much interested in a certain class who come over here and are working hard under quite different circumstances from those to which they are accustomed, but from whom one never hears a word of complaint or self-pity.

All Famous People.

The little place, of which I am writing is entirely made up of these people. One of the head waiters, for instance, was a famous Hamlet of the Russian stage, and every waitress and cook in the place has been at some time an actor or singer in his own country. The only entertainment, as a matter of fact, that is given at this place is given by these men and women. For a certain period of time it is very difficult to get anything to eat if one so desires, as the entire personnel is entertaining with songs, and very amusing ones too. Even one of the cooks comes out of the kitchen, wearing his white cap and apron, and sings. One of the waiters is a beautiful dancer, another one sings and plays his own accompaniment.

I have said before that it is interesting in Paris to watch people forget their Anglo-Saxon origin and become natural and unconscious under the Parisian influence. It is just as interesting to notice exactly the same thing affect them in this place. It is the usual thing to see all in the place joining in the singing, throwing confetti at each other, and altogether behaving like children out for a good time.

During one of the intervals in which the orchestra was not playing, he went to the piano and started playing college songs. It ended by not only the boys and all the others in the restaurant singing, but also the Russians, with their deep and typical Russian voices, trying hard to understand and join the singing of "Fair Harvard" and the rest.

The whole atmosphere is one of pleasant comradeship. From the moment you are greeted at the door by the proprietor, dressed in a Russian costume, during the time that you have a word of appreciation from the waiter or the violinist of the orchestra (who, incidentally, is a symphony player), until you leave with a word of appreciation from the proprietor and his assurance that he waits for the day when you will return. I have yet to see anyone who goes there, old or young, resist its atmosphere, and invariably they do return.
