

Entries For L. and D. Basketball Association Close Tomorrow

L. and D. Expects to Open Up All Group Games on Nov. 23

Central C. I. Is New Entry for Juvenile Section.

The London and District Basketball Association, the entries for which close Thursday night with Gordon Butler, assistant director at the Y, will show growth this year, even though the secretary has not yet been despatched with applications. President Christensen will likely call a meeting Friday night.

Group games are expected to open about Nov. 23. The senior group of the L. and D. B. A. is an intermediate group of the O. A. B. A. competition. The junior group of the district association is expected to have the most number of entries, although the senior series is also looking encouraging.

The group games will be staged at the Y. M. C. A. gymnasium, and the dates will be allotted so that two or three matches will be included on a night's program.

Indications are that the cage games will have even a larger following this year than last. A good calibre of basketball will be furnished by the competing teams.

In the juvenile series a large number of entries from the various churches of the city and district will be received. The C. S. E. T. League develops many basketball players who qualify for the juvenile section of the association.

Central C. I. is entering the juvenile section.

Teams contemplating entering the league are requested to place their entries early so that final arrangements may be made for the drafting of the schedules.

Bolivians Angry With Luis Angel

South American Idol Turns Deaf Ear To Plaudits.

Associated Press Despatch. Buenos Ayres, Nov. 13.—A despatch to La Nachon from La Paz, Bolivia, says that Luis Angel Firpo incurred the displeasure of the residents of the city by his indifferent attitude toward the enthusiastic reception they accorded him.

Firpo, the despatch says, was in a sulky mood when he arrived in the La Paz railway station. He was met by cheering crowds, who were displeased when their idol hastily fled in an automobile from their presence and they raised hostile cries when he refused to raise his hat in acknowledgment of their greetings.

The boxer added to the irritation of the Bolivians when he refused to attend a football game held in his honor, and when he failed to appear for other demonstrations prepared for him.

THE PANORAMA OF BASEBALL

A Pictorial History of the Growth of the Game.

WHEN THE FIRST COLLEGE TEAMS MET.

College baseball plays a very important part in the early history of baseball. Walter Camp is authority for the statement that as far back as 1787 the faculty of Princeton frowned upon ball (whatever the game was), as detrimental to the health of the students. Even as late as 1868 the Yale papers looked askance at baseball—probably the old feeling that it was not a gentleman's game. For it must be remembered that there were opponents who deplored the fact that baseball was becoming the national sport. There were some who looked upon croquet as the possible rival of cricket. Harvard and Yale often

played the champions of the country, and it is on record that in 1880 Yale met professional teams in thirteen games and came out the victor in eleven.

The first intercollegiate game took place at Pittsfield, Mass., July 1, 1859, and the score was Amherst 73, Williams 32. According to an account written by one of the players, there were 13 men on each side, 65 runs were to be the game, you could spot a runner with the ball, there was no armor worn, there were no uniforms for Amherst except a blue badge. According to this account, Amherst is reported to have hired the village blacksmith to pitch for them. Williams came to the game looking their fittest; they were dressed alike and wore belts marked "Williams." As showing the sedateness of the re-

porter's work of the time, it is worth while quoting an excerpt from the Franklin and Hampshire Gazette: "Amherst certainly played the better, we think, in every department of the game. Indeed, so great a victory cannot be accounted for otherwise. In knocking, they had the advantage of side knocks and back strikes; in running, Williams certainly excelled as far as speed was concerned, but lost at least eight or ten minutes by premature efforts, while the Amherst players ran only at the word of their captain. The catching on the part of Amherst was undoubtedly much superior; no balls were allowed to pass the catcher which were within his reach, and very few were allowed to drop which he touched. He missed but one ticked ball in the course of the whole game."

This was round ball in contradistinction to league ball, which came in later. Harvard goes down in baseball history because of the name of Thayer. It was Fred W. Thayer of '75 who invented the mask; it was Ernest L. Thayer of '85 who wrote the immortal "Casey at the Bat." According to records, Harvard played its first game with Yale, July 25, 1868; score, 25-17 in favor of Harvard. Long before that Harvard sophomores had played Williams. This was in 1864, just at the time the Harvard Baseball Club was formed. The picture of the team shown here as of 1868 is thought by some to be that of 1865. Here is Harvard's record, on tour, in 1869:

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Urges Abolition of Summer Rule

Dartmouth President Would Allow Playing For Money.

Associated Press Despatch. Hanover, N. H., Nov. 13.—The college rule against summer baseball should be abolished or enforced on a uniform intercollegiate basis, or intercollegiate baseball should be abandoned, President James Pritchard, chairman of the Dartmouth faculty committee on athletics, said in his annual report last night.

"The summer baseball question continues to bother the Dartmouth athletic council," the report stated. "The undergraduates cannot be convinced that there is anything about playing baseball for money in the summer which should be considered objectionable. Moreover, they object, and with some reason, to the strict enforcement of the rules which we attempted when many other colleges are much more lenient."

TIGERS WILL MEET H. R. C. ON SATURDAY

East and West To Battle For Canadian Title December 1.

It was decided to adhere to the original draw, and Hamilton Rowing Club will meet Tigers next Saturday at the H. A. A. field in the first game, with the winner meeting Queen's in Kingston on Nov. 24. Hamilton Rowing Club and Tigers agreed on the major officials, with Ben Simpson as referee, Billy Mallott as umpire and Bob Isbister as head linesman.

The winners of the game at Kingston on the 24th will meet Regina, winners of the Western Canada championship, at Toronto on Saturday, Dec. 1, the day of the O. H. A. annual convention.

YALE AND PRINCETON GIRLS SELVES FOR TILT

New Haven Gridders Plan Intensive Workout in Bowl Today.

New Haven, Conn., Nov. 13.—In an effort to achieve co-ordination on defense, an element sadly lacking in the Maryland game, the coaches sent the Yale eleven through a brief scrimmage in the bowl this afternoon, and will follow it with a longer and more intensive one tomorrow. It is said that the team which will face Princeton at the opening whistle on Saturday will be used in the scrimmages.

J., Nov. 13.—With Frank Rutan back at left tackle after a prolonged absence, due to injuries, and Bob Dinsmore again calling the signals, the Princeton Varsity will be given a short scrimmage tomorrow afternoon in preparation for the Yale game. It is understood that the practice will be open to the student body for the first time in many weeks.

Los Angeles, Cal., Nov. 13.—Yesterday's Coast League battle at Avalon was only a skirmish in a fight that will be carried to a finish, according to a statement made today by William H. McCarthy, deposed president of the league. He advised that he still considered himself president, and would act as such.

"Records of the league will remain in my possession," said McCarthy. "So will the funds of the league. I shall perform my duties as president without regard to what transpired yesterday at Catalina Island."

AMERICAN ASSOCIATION MAY HAVE SHORTER YEAR

He has outlined a tentative schedule calling for 154 games, to the club owners for their approval. Previously the league played 168 games. The posed schedule sets April 16 as the opening day, and Sept. 21 for the final games.

President Hickey said the shorter schedule would permit better weather conditions for the playing of the junior world's series between pennant winners of the International League and American Association.

Detroit Bantam Trains For Villa

Joey Schwartz Will Meet Champion Next Monday.

Detroit, Nov. 13.—Joey Schwartz, local bantamweight, is doing most of his training out in the open for his match with Pancho Villa, world's flyweight champion, at Danceland next Monday. Joey is running several miles every morning at Navin Field. In the afternoon he boxes several rounds at the Grand River Club.

Schwartz expects to weigh around 117 pounds for Villa, which will mean that he will have a weight advantage over the champion of about five pounds. However, Pancho is in the habit of giving away weight in order to get matches, and this difference should make little difference to him.

Howard Mayberry, who beat Tommy Hughes Monday evening, will tackle Joe Lucas in the other ten-pound bout. Lucas has become a favorite in the east, where he has won several matches.

LOOK TO CHANCE TO MAKE CHICAGO DANGEROUS TEAM

Spring Training Will Mean Return To Rivalry With McGraw.

CAMPS SELECTED

New York, Nov. 13.—The St. Louis Americans have decided to return to Mobile for training next spring, thus settling the training camp question for all the clubs in that circuit except New York, Boston and Chicago.

If the New York or Boston Clubs decide to go west of the Mississippi they will be the only organization of that circuit to do so. Most of the American League clubs will be either in Florida or close to it. Cleveland will be at Lakeland, Fla., Washington at Tampa, Detroit at Augusta, Ga., and Philadelphia at Montgomery, Ala.

Just where the Chicago Americans will go probably will be decided in large measure where the Giants go.

Wherever these two clubs go, their spring series will have more than the usual attention because of the return to rivalry of McGraw and Chance, the two National League managers who made things hum in that organization in 1908. If Chance can do as well with Chicago as he did with Boston the Sox will be a walloping team and dangerous throughout their circuit.

Last year the Browns started to train at Mobile and then set forth on a barnstorming tour of Texas. Perhaps they got a little revenue out of it, but it didn't do their players any good.

The Cleveland had the right idea, in 1923. They stuck around their training camp until it was time to go north and play the regular schedule. The result was that they were the best trained team to start the American League season. Had they not been in fine condition they never would have begun to make the fight for a place in the race as quickly as they did. In fact, they were better seasoned at the beginning of the year than they were at the finish.

Detroit trained well last spring, but embarked on an exhibition trip after training was over, and that undid about all they had accomplished in August. Cobb said he never would permit himself to be led into another venture of that sort. The Yankees are likely to trot back to New Orleans for the 1924 training period.

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
