For the first time since his illness began there was a momentary hallucination, the patient believing that the shadow fifted through the room. The doctor and the attendant succeeded in quieting his fears. Outside of these passing periods of depression the general condition of mental alertness continues.

When Doctors Mazzoni and Lapponi made their morning call, the patient enquired about Dr. Rossoni, asking: "Why doesn't he come to see me?"

Being told that Dr. Rossoni was ill, he said: "Tell him he must take care of himself"

Cardinal Satolli, in a conversation with a representative of the Associated Press. said that the life was only kept in the body of the Pontiff by the constant use of powerful restoratives, and other persons equally reliable who saw the Pope yesterday, and who had seen him on previous days of his illness, agree with Cardinal Satolli in saying that death has made all his ravages, save the separation of the soul and the body.

The doctors announced to the public that Pope Leo's general condition is satisfactory. An explanation of the apparent contradiction lies in the fact that the doctors expected His Holiness to die long before this, and now are exercising in their bulletins an excess of caution.
