

PROTECTORATE OVER MOROCCO

France, Under New Power
Granted by Sultan, May Occupy Any Portion of State With Military

FEZ, Morocco, April 2.—The treaty establishing a French protectorate over Morocco, which was signed by the Sultan recently, provides that France may occupy with military forces any part of Morocco necessary for the preservation of order, after notifying the Sultan.

The treaty defines the support which France will give to maintain the authority of the Sultan and also the powers of the French resident general. It provides for the reorganization of the finances of the state and forbids the Sultan to contract loans without the assent of the French government.

CABLES TO CANADA

British Government Does Not Favor State-Owned Methods of Communication

LONDON, April 2.—Postmaster General Samuelson stated in the house of commons today that the government did not favor state owned transatlantic cables to Canada nor a subsidy for that purpose. If a company offered to construct a cable to carry messages at reduced rates, then the proposal would be welcomed.

ENLARGING QUEBEC

The Ungava Bill Will Add 400,000 Sq. Miles to Province

QUEBEC, April 2.—Quebec province is being extended 400,000 square miles. The Ungava bill was laid before the house tonight by Premier Gouin. The new territory is to have separate representation in the Federal house in addition to what is now sent from Quebec.

AFTER THE SESSION

Cabinet Ministers to Take Brief Rest Before Resuming Routine Duties

OTTAWA, April 2.—This week will see a migration of cabinet ministers from Ottawa for a brief rest after the session. Premier Borden expects to leave Ottawa for Hot Springs, Va., where he has indulged in a week of golf, his favorite pastime. He will be accompanied by Mrs. Borden, Mr. Frank Cochrane will leave tomorrow for a few days with his family in Toronto. Hon. Robert Rogers, Hon. Martin Burrell, and either Hon. F. D. Monk or Hon. L. P. Pelletier will go to Winnipeg to attend the banquet which the Conservatives of Manitoba will tender Premier Borden on April 11.

None of the ministers, however, will remain away long. A great deal of routine business has accumulated during the session, and there are a number of appointments to be made.

On Friday Hon. J. D. Hazen will leave for his home at St. John, N.B., where he will spend Easter. It is not yet decided when he will leave for Great Britain to consult the Admiralty.

PANAMA CELEBRATIONS

Suggested Cycle of Festivals to Extend From Vancouver to San Diego

SAN FRANCISCO, April 2.—As first suggested by George L. Hutchins, general manager of the Portland Rose festival, a series of festivals was organized here today by the festival organizations of the Pacific coast under the auspices of the Panama-Pacific exposition. President Charles C. Moore of the exposition said:

"The selection of San Francisco for the coming exposition is only incidental. We of the coast but asked that our metropolis be given an opportunity to do something for the nation. We owe a debt of gratitude to the states of Oregon and Washington and to the southern part of this state for the information and assistance they have so generously given."

Mr. Hutchins said in part:

"This congress is the first step taken to organize a coast wide movement for the benefit of the Pacific coast. More than \$12,000,000 will be expended this year in festivals on this coast. Let us make this in reality the playground of the world. Let us begin with New Year's Day in Pasadena in a war of roses and then San Diego, Los Angeles, Santa Barbara, Santa Rosa, San Francisco, Portland, Tacoma, Seattle, Bellingham, Vancouver, etc. Spokane, Fern, and all others in the game will swell the mighty chorus as we close the cycle of festivals with the Christ-Carols in San Francisco."

Gangs of Men Attack Alberta Construction Camps and Destroy Property Wholesale

CALGARY, Alberta, April 2.—Rioting expected when 5,000 men sent out by Winnipeg reach the construction camps on the Canadian Northern railway to break the strike. Ten thousand men are pouring into Calgary as a result of an agitation of the I. W. W. American organizations. Last night they attacked the construction camps, destroyed all property in sight.

SUFFRAGETTES TO BE HATLESS

Boycott of Millinery Establishments Is Latest Method Suggested to Win Way to Franchise

LONDON, April 1.—At a meeting of suffragettes held here to protest against what the speakers described as the "base betrayal by the House of Commons," Mrs. Despard, who was sentenced to prison in 1909 and was arrested for picketing Premier Asquith's house, said the time had arrived for the militant suffragettes to adopt more effective methods to maintain their desires. She urged, in effect, a boycott.

She said the women should not buy hats, which will hurt the tradesmen worse than smashing windows. She declared they should not go to the seaside resorts represented by parliament by men of anti-suffragette tendencies, and should not subscribe funds to churches or institutions, or invest their money in England.

WINE SECURED FOR NEW JAIL

New Reformatory Institution for Southern Vancouver Island on Wilkinson Road—Most Modern Methods to Prevail

The purchase was yesterday completed by the provincial government of the site selected for the new provincial jail to serve southern Vancouver Island, and which is about three miles out of Victoria on the Wilkinson road, the new suburban line of the B. C. Electric Railway Co., traversing one corner of the acquired property and providing the needed facilities of quick and economical communication with Victoria. Originally the property constituted a partly developed farm, but some little time ago it was bought for subdivision and thus placed on the market, the government's agents being obliged to repurchase the lots from individual buyers.

The site comprises some 24.56 acres, beautifully situated and thoroughly adapted to prison farm purposes. It is contained in lots 1, 2, 3 and 4, subdivision of the northwest part of section 5, Lake district.

The intention is to immediately have plans prepared and proceed with the erection of the new buildings, which are to be of the most modern character, the determination of the department being to make the institution one of correction and reformation rather than simply of punishment.

An important feature will be made of farm and general out-door work, while special and separate accommodation will be provided for junior offenders in order that these may not be brought into contact with and suffer contamination by older prisoners.

A sum of \$100,000 is being set aside for the establishment of the new jail, and this will permit of its erection during the present summer.

Suit Against Meat Packers

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo., April 2.—The taking of testimony in the Missouri suit against the meat packers set for yesterday was continued until April 15, because of the absence of the attorney-general and one of the leading counsel for the packers.

Two Victims of Cave-In

LEWISTOWN, Mont., April 2.—Charles A. Keys and George Swarthout, homesteaders, were killed when a pit from which they were taking coal caved in. Swarthout is a brother of Mrs. Marvin of Los Angeles. Keys is also from Los Angeles.

FLYING MACHINE PATENTS

WASHINGTON, April 2.—A decision which may affect the patents of Wright brothers, Curtiss and other airplane inventors was made yesterday by the district of Columbia court of appeals when it reversed the action of the commissioner of patents and authorized the reinstatement of an application of Hugo Matulath of New York for a patent on a flying machine filed January 8, 1900.

MR. BABCOCK COMES BACK TO PROVINCE

The announcement is made with authority of Hon. W. J. Bowser, Fisheries Commissioner for British Columbia, that Mr. John Pease Babcock, who until a year or so ago held office as deputy commissioner in the provincial department, and who is recognized as one of the most authoritative experts in his specialized branch of science in all America, has been induced to again ally himself with the department, being appointed consulting expert and will again take up his residence in Victoria, where he has been re-visiting old friends during some weeks past.

Mr. Babcock's re-appointment is incidental to the reorganization and enlargement of the scope of the department's activities, notably in connection with the exploitation of the shell fish supply of the province, and its special protection and administration. Mr. Babcock will take immediate charge of the departmental field work and will undoubtedly be instrumental in producing most desirable results. His return and re-employment in connection with the British Columbia fisheries branch is a matter for general satisfaction throughout the country.

THE SUGAR BILL

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 2.—Hearings of the house free sugar bill were begun yesterday before the Senate committee on finance. They are expected to continue a fortnight, with the cane and beet sugar interests allowed a week each to present testimony.

DELUGED CENTRES IN MISSISSIPPI VALLEY

Death Roll of Floods Increased to Eight—Kentucky Towns Are Heavy Sufferers—Farm Lands Inundated

LOUISVILLE, Ky., April 2.—The area affected by the flood caused by an almost unprecedented volume of water in the Mississippi was not extended a great deal yesterday, but the situation at the deluged centres became more menacing. Two more levee breaks were reported near Chester, where 7000 acres of farming land is inundated.

Twelve hours of sunshine and a slight check in the rise of the river have combined to give the situation a more optimistic outlook in the opinion of the government engineers, who said last night that if the stage at Memphis does not go over 42 feet the levees would hold. The weather forecast at Memphis urged managers of the railways entering that city to warn inhabitants of those districts to move to higher ground.

AVIATOR DASHED TO GROUND

SAN DIEGO, April 2.—Aviator H. F. Kearney's aeroplane was caught by a gust of wind and dashed to the ground yesterday. Just before the accident Kearney had been doing some fancy flying, but when the machine fell it was only 20 feet from the ground. Kearney escaped with a few bruises. The machine is a total wreck.
