SMALLPOX AT NEGUAC

Smallpox is reported from Lower Neguac district and C. I. Matley, chairman of the Northumberland County Board of Health has taken action to prevent the spread of the disease. Several nurses have been quarantined. Col. Malby says that some of the people in the district had been keeping the disease hidden. Officials are now at work and it is hoped that no very serious consequences will result. Dr. Fisher, of the Provincial Board of Health, was in town on Saturday and went down to Neguac where smallpox has broken out. He found only about ten cases and thinks that there is no danger in the situation.
