The price of news print was increased 40 per cent by the paper mills in Canada on July 1st. To prevent newspaper offices stocking up, the paper mills and jobbers for months past have refused to supply any customer beyond the average.

It is stated in Digby that the firm of Condon & Denton, of that town have been awarded the contract for reconstruction of the post office building in Annapolis and will begin the work without delay. It is hardly possible that it can be completed however until next summer.

About twelve hundred people have left the Magdalen Islands. The exodus is due to the fact that living expenses on the islands have increased faster than the price of fish, while steady work at good pay in the pulp mills of Quebec has drawn the Magdalen Islanders to the mainland.
