RULES of the North American INDIAN INSTI-TUTION, established at Fredericton, New-Brunswick, the 19th day of January, 1814.

PRESIDENT,

His Honor Major-General SIR THOMAS SAUM-AREZ, President and Commander in Chief of the Province of New-Brunswick, &c. &c.

RULES.

1st. That materials for building Huts according to their own custom to form little towns should be provided, or if they could be prevailed upon to build Log Houses, aided by Colonial Carpenters; every encouragement should be given them on this plan, as being more permanent than the former.

2d. To collect and diffuse throughout Great-Britain & this country, accurate information respecting the agricultural, and commercial capacities of British America, and the intellectual, moral and political

condition of the Aborigines.

3d. To promote the instruction of the Indians in letters, and in useful knowledge, and to cultivate a friendly connection with them.

4th. To endeavour to enlighten the minds of the Indians, with respect to their true interest, and to dif-

fuse useful information among them.

5th. To introduce amongst them such of the improvements and useful arts of Europe, as are suited to their condition.
