MEETING OF THE SYNOD.

The Synod of the Diocese of Ontario met in the Cathedral at Kingston, on the evening of the 19th of June, where after a very solemn and hearty service a sermon was preached by Rev. E. A. W. Hannington. The business sessions began next morning after Holy Communion. There was an unusually full attendance, both of clergy and lay delegates. The mission fund has decreased its indebtedness somewhat, and the contributions for mission work were about \$1500 in excess of the previous year. The board is sadly hampered by the want of funds, and one of the great problems (not in this diocese only,) is how to induce wealthy people to be as liberal in proportion as those who have no superfluous money. The Widows and Orphans' Fund is also being strained by demands made on it, without the needed increase of voluntary contributions. A committee was appointed to. make preliminary arrangements for the division of the funds on an equitable basis when our new diocese of Ottawa is formed. A meeting of the Archdeacon and Rural Deans of this Archdeaconry was held during the Synod, and it was arranged to ask Mr. Hannington to take charge of the collection of the new endowment fund, the Bishop appointing a "locum tenens" to his parish while he is so occupied.

WOMAN'S AUXILIARY.

The monthly meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary to Domestic and Foreign Missions, was held in St. John's School room, Tuesday, June 27th at 3 p.m. There was a much smaller attendance than usual, partly owing to the warm weather and possibly to the closing of a number of the schools on that day.
