

will be held for "both specialized administrative machinery capable of taking immediate decisions, and machinery for the general exchange of views on objectives and methods of approach."

It is for this second function that the ILO is considered peculiarly appropriate, as being representative of large sections of the world's population, and because of the fact that the delegates are representatives of "or other social forces having a real stake in the questions of social policy under consideration."

In a comprehensive survey of a possible program of action in the social field for the next five years, the ILO draws attention to the following programs: the organization of employment from war to peace; social security; war policy; freedom of association and collective bargaining; housing and rural extension; minimum standards for factories; model safety codes for industry; health, education and vocational opportunities; the maritime work of the ILO; the agricultural work of the ILO; general policy and unemployment; social policy in Axis countries occupied by the United States; restoration of economic activity and international trade; professional workers' migration; international comparison of living costs and standards; relations between international investment and standards of living; and minimum standards of social policy in dependent territories in regard to such matters as slavery and forced labour, land policy, housing, social security, prohibition of child and women's work, and children's work.
