two years ago when it almost doubled the money supply. It injected a great deal of this drug, and since then the economy has craved a great deal more. As a result we have witnessed a galloping inflation.

The Minister of Finance tried to put the brakes on last June and again in November, but on both occasions he was six months late. He has failed miserably as Minister of Finance. The Minister of Trade and Commerce knows full well that if he had been minister of finance he might well have been more in tune with the economy. I am sure he would have been, because he has been with the economy and knows the ups and downs of business economics. Our Minister of Finance has led a sheltered life, most of it as a civil servant. There is a great difference. I believe the Minister of Trade and Commerce would have been in tune with the economic conditions of Canada to a far greater degree. Perhaps then, as has been suggested in a press interview, he could have brought in a balanced budget last year, avoiding the difficulty which has occured this year. Today we are witnessing a run on the dollar, and I suppose the \$400 million loan is intended to stem the withdrawal of money from Canada by the United States parents of Canadian companies.

Now that the hon, member for Medicine Hat (Mr. Olson) has joined the government side of the house he has swallowed the philosophy of that party, but I note that he has not attempted to take part in this debate. Apparently he does not know whether the government should be responsible to the people and to parliament, or whether it should be all superior in the position of a dictatorship. He does not know whether he believes in those righteous principles he advocated when he sat to our far left, or whether he left those principles when he walked across the floor of the house. He must realize that the Liberal government has failed to control the purse strings. If anyone is in doubt about that, I suggest he read the economic council report and the Auditor General's report. If anyone is still in doubt, he should look at our balance of payments program and our agricultural prices, which are at the lowest point for the last ten years.
