- 3. The preconstruction estimated cost was approximately \$6 million. However, changes were effected later in the design of the terminal to include a third floor and a control tower and it was later decided to provide furnishings.
- 4. The feasibility study started in 1963. Construction started on the runway extension in September 1964 and on the airport terminal in February 1966.
- 5. The Foundation of Canada Engineering Corp. Ltd. of 2200 Yonge Street, Toronto, provided engineering consultancy services at the cost of \$377,950.55 and was the only outside professional consulting firm engaged on the project. All other professional services were provided by the in house professionals of the Canadian Department of Transport.
- 6. Over seven thousand commercial air movements were recorded in 1972 at the airport. Statistics are not available within CIDA for 1973.
- 7. Prior to the construction of the Bandaranaike airport Sri Lanka did not have an airport which could handle the jet aircraft being used and planned to be used by international carriers. Sri Lanka, being strategically located on major intercontinental trade routes (both sea and air), expected to act as a major port of call on these routes. One other major advantage to the Sri Lankan economy was the anticipated increase in the volume of tourists which would result from the improvement of the airport facilities. Statistics of traffic at Bandaranaike Airport reflect a steady growth of both aircraft movement and passenger traffic. The current volume of traffic, and its annual rate of increase is, in fact, far greater than estimated at the outset of the project.

Can a Public Servant become president of a federal or provincial political organization without violating the Public Service Employment Act or Regulations?
