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## PRIVILEGE

### GRAIN—WHEAT—OPPORTUNITY FOR PRODUCERS TO DELIVER TO MORE THAN ONE POINT

**Mr. S. J. Korchinski (Mackenzie):** Mr. Speaker, my office has indicated my intention to raise a question of privilege with reference to a question I raised last Monday. I am sorry to see that the Minister of Justice (Mr. Lang), who is responsible for the Wheat Board, has left the chamber. Last Monday I asked if farmers will be able to deliver to several alternate points. The minister, in answering on two occasions in the question period said that this has been done. I then raised a point of order—

**Mr. Speaker:** Order, please. I regret to interrupt the hon. member but must draw to his attention Standing Order 17(2) which reads:

Unless notice of motion has been given under Standing Order 42, any member proposing to raise a question of privilege other than one arising out of proceedings in the chamber during the course of a sitting shall give to the Speaker a written statement of the question at least one hour prior to the opening of a sitting.

The hon. member, I am sure, well knows that he has not given the Chair written notice of his intention to resurrect the question raised on Monday. Unfortunately, in the circumstances, I feel I cannot let the hon. member go ahead.
