opinion on whether the Government has broken this promise as well?

Mr. Foster: Mr. Speaker, the Government has broken a number of promises made in the 1984 election campaign. Promise number 11 was to expand agriculture research and development by providing greater assistance. The Estimates for the Department of Agriculture for this year show that the research budget has been reduced by \$23 million. I think this is unconscionable because research will not provide a pay-back this year or next, year, but several years in the future.

The Tories promised to establish a national marketing board for tobacco, and that promise was broken. The Tories made a commitment to revise Section 31 of the Income Tax Act to reflect the principles of equity. The Government, of course, has not acted on that. Promise number 14 was to allocate the necessary funding to assist producers in refinancing their loans at current prevailing rates. The current rate of the Bank of Canada is around 9 per cent. If the Government implemented that promise it would save farmers a lot of interest.

With regard to the agribond program, the committee studied this and came up with a very workable program but, unfortunately, it was not reflected in either of the two Budgets we have had since then, or in the Speech from the Throne on Wednesday.

I did not at all mind spending 11 hours here to elect the Speaker. The patience of all of us augurs well for the future. The manner in which our newly elected Speaker has conducted himself over the past three days, the wisdom with which he has spoken and the collective confidence that he has in us and we have in him also augers well for the future.

depth replies to the Throne Speech. My congratulations to both of them.

I represent the riding of Willowdale which is geographically located at the epicentre of Metropolitan Toronto. Willowdale, blessed with hard-working people and a favourable geographic location, is fast becoming the heart of Metropolitan Toronto.

Throughout the summer, as I have done in previous years, I went door-to-door in my riding asking my constituents what they thought of the Government and if there were any issues they felt should be addressed. I managed to visit personally over 6,000 households. The response by the people of Willow-dale toward the Government and its policies was very positive. Although I got an earful on some issues, in general the response was very supportive.

The people of Willowdale were very impressed with the agenda put forth in our first Throne Speech. Our second Throne Speech will continue the Government's commitment to enacting legislation which will continue to benefit all Canadians. In just two short years the Progressive Conservative Government has taken significant action toward rebuilding the Canadian economy. This is the best economic recovery that any western country has ever seen. Confidence has been restored and jobs have been created. Interest rates are down and the deficit is falling. Before September, 1984, 11.7 per cent of the workforce was unemployed. Today the rate is down two full percentage points to 9.9 per cent. This is the lowest level in four years. These are indeed big ticket items.
