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that jobs are being created at an unprecedented rate in the fourth quarter, which is traditionally a slow growth period. There were 1,500 companies polled across Canada. About 26 per cent said that they plan staff increases, and 13 per cent said that they plan to reduce staff. Job creation in the fourth quarter is the highest for any year in the 1980s.

Take construction, for example, which faces lay-offs at this time of the year. It is reported that 23 per cent will be seeking to increase their hirings.

This trend is concrete proof of our Government's economic policies which have seen the creation of 1,295,000 jobs, lower interest rates, price stability, low inflation, and an improved investment climate.

NEED FOR EDUCATION AND COUNSELLING

I urge the Government to develop a comprehensive reproductive health care policy immediately in consultation with the Planned Parenthood Federation of Canada.
