Government Orders

Hon. Perrin Beatty (Minister of National Health and Welfare): Mr. Speaker, I wonder whether the House would bear with me for just a couple of minutes as I have a comment arising from the hon. member's intervention.

As the hon. member for Bonavista—Trinity—Conception knows, I have nothing but the highest regard for both his contribution to his country while serving in uniform and for the depth and quality of his contribution in the House of Commons when he participates in debates related to the defence of Canada.

As my colleagues in the House of Commons know, one of the practices I try to follow in leaving a portfolio is to refrain generally from making public comment, because I know that my successor has a right to run the department without having me looking over his or her shoulder and without feeling any constraints based on my previous involvement there.

I do want to take advantage of the opportunity presented by the hon. member's remarks today to add just one or two comments in response to him. In saying that I want to associate myself fully with the remarks that the hon. member made about the quality of the men and women serving in Canada's Armed Forces and the tremendous dedication shown by the members of their families. Having spoken to the families of service people who are serving often under very difficult circumstances, and realizing the strains put upon those families of service people, I am very much aware of the human cost often involved in the decision to serve one's country.

I think all members of the House of Commons on both sides of the Chamber would want to support strongly the families and the men and women serving in the Canadian Forces and also associate themselves with the remarks made by the hon. gentleman when he referred to the tremendous contribution made by civilian members within the Department of National Defence.

My hon. friend will know that those of us on this side of the House will disagree with him on his feelings about the need to have called Parliament back early for a debate on this matter. I think he acknowledges that the provisions of the National Defence Act have been fully complied with. The government has made an effort from

the outset to ensure that the Canadian people and Parliament were kept fully informed of the reasons for our involvement in the Middle East and also of the nature of that involvement. The hon, member concluded his remarks by insisting that Parliament continue to be informed. I am sure that my colleagues, the Minister of National Defence and the Secretary of State for External Affairs, will attempt to do precisely that.

I want to associate myself fully with the vast majority of the content of his remarks and congratulate him on what I think were very useful and constructive comments.
