Dr. Bancroft delivered a brief address, in which he alluded to the deceased as being a most estimable young man, who was leaning towards the office of the ministry. He had inclined towards God from his earliest days, and been a Sunday-School teacher; and of him his companions had remarked that he was not like other boys; and his discourse was singularly pure and devoid of offence. The body having been removed from the church, it was taken for interment to the Mount Royal Cemetery, where the last military funeral honours were paid to a young man of apparently great promise.
