Translation of a Letter marked A, inclosed in the Earl of Bristol's Letter of Aug. 31, 1761.

I.

MONSIEUR *de Buffy* having presented to Mr. *Pitt* a Memorial on the Part of his Court, concerning the Discussions of *Great Britain* with *Spain*; the King my Master ordered His Secretary of State to send back the said Memorial, as totally inadmissible.

II.

It has been told him, that *France* has not had, at any Time, a Right to meddle in our Disputes with the Court of *Madrid*.

III.

Further, that it would be looked upon as offensive to the King's Dignity, and incompatible with the good Faith of the Negotiation, that further Mention should be made of the Differences of our Courts.

Orders to make Remonstrances on the Conduct of *Spain*, who, whilst she lived in good Correspondence
