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efficiently cured, and has been paid off. There have been ten adult baptisms and confirmations, six of the recipients being parents.

Since my last report, Island Brook, which, though not forming a part of my Mission, has been for many years under my pastoral care, has, with my own concurrence, been passed over by the Lord Bishop of Quebec to the hands of the Professor of Pastoral Theology of Bishop's College. I think it my duty to state that Island Brook has received the ministrations of the Church at my hands for seven years, for two years once a month, and for five years fort-

nightly, with unfailing punctuality.

I am thankful to say that since writing my last report I have been able to discharge all the duties in connection with these three Missions without any interruption.

The necessity for a sub-division of these Missions is

vearly growing more pressing.

On the 28th November, the Bishop arrived to hold two confirmations; nine were presented at Danville, seventeen at Troutbrook,—the candidates being chiefly married or elderly people.

The congregation at these two places are more than holding their own; they are quietly and steadily increasing. The communicants are doubling in numbers. The heartiness of the services, as evinced in the responding and singing, is a matter of general notice. I am sorry, however, to remark that the offertories are weak; it would be a good thing for the Church at large were the Government to call in all the five cent pieces.
