PUBLIC SCHOOL CONTRACTS FOR OVER MILLION DOLLARS

Half the Tenders to Be Accepted During Next Month—Work on Ten Schools to Start as Fast as Plans Can Be Completed.

School contracts for over a million dollars will be made for work to be started this season as rapidly as the plans can be completed for buildings urgently required, and to be rushed to completion as fast as the latest machinery and methods will permit. Plans and specifications are being prepared as rapidly as possible. Half a million worth of contracts for new buildings will be signed by the board of education next month. The cool half million required by the building department and the property committee is to put pressure on the building superintendent to hurry up.

WILL CONSIDER TOLLS IN PUBLIC

Senate Committee So Decides—Republican Backs Up Wilson Strongly.

Canadian Press Dispatch. WASHINGTON, April 6.—Publicity for deliberations on the bill to repeal toll exemption for American ships passing thru the Panama Canal was determined upon today by the senate committee on interoceanic canals, which tomorrow will begin consideration of the controversy in all its aspects. Senator O'Gorman, chairman of the committee, decided upon open sessions at the outset after a conference with his colleagues. Whether hearings are to be held has not been decided, but this will be determined when the house repeal bill and various compromise senate measures are formally taken up. Senator O'Gorman, leading Democratic opponent of the repeal, and others who join with him in the fight insist that there will be no effort to delay in coming to a decision. The issue reaches the floor of the senate, various forces at work to complicate the situation make it improbable that a vote can be reached for several weeks. **McCumber's Strong Appeal.** Senator McCumber, Republican, of North Dakota, a member of the foreign relations committee, who steadfastly refuses to join the party opposition to President Wilson's policy, addressed the senate at length today in support of the repeal bill. He flatly declared that toll exemption for American ships was a violation of the Hay-Pauncefote treaty, and that it was

against the spirit of the senate when the treaty was ratified. For the congress to insist upon toll exemption for American coastwise ships, he said, was to hide behind the American flag while burlesquing the treasury for the benefit of a coastwise shipping trust. Administration senators tonight seemed to be more confident than ever that the house repeal bill would carry in the senate unamended, maintaining that several Democrats who had been classed as doubtful positively would support the president, and that the majority on the final roll call in favor of repeal would be at least ten votes. Eight or nine Republican senators are now counted upon to support the repeal, despite the effort of their leaders to unite the minority against the measure. **AUTHORIZED TO PREACH ABOUT MILLENNIUM DAWN** General Ministerial Association Must Be Content to Learn Sect Will Continue. A resolution asking that the E. G. McConkey license should not be renewed was passed yesterday by the General Ministerial Association. The sect who are preaching the millennium dawn propaganda and distributing literature at the General Hospital, also came in for some consideration. In reply to a letter from the ministerial body, addressed to them, they stated that they had the proper authority for distributing the literature, and that they would continue to do so. Duke of Connaught Will Be Asked to Open Nurses' Home.

WANT TORONTO CHOIR

Dr. Vogt Asked to Visit Woodstock Before Going to England.

WOODSTOCK, April 6.—Mayor Hobson received a letter from government house this morning, stating that the viceregal party would be in Woodstock on May 8 on their proposed trip thru western Ontario. The communication also stated that the Duchess of Connaught and Princess Patricia would accompany the Governor-General on the trip. It is likely that the arrangements for the opening of the nurses' home were changed to that date, in order to have the duke preside over the ceremony, together with Bishop Farrington.

Communications have been sent from here to Dr. Vogt, who has replied that he will look into the matter further. In view of the fact that Dr. Vogt is on his way to Oxford, it is thought probable that he will accept the invitation before the choir leaves on its tour of the old country next year.

SUIT OVER MOTOR CAR WON BY PLAINTIFF

Ernest Constant Given Damages and Costs From People Who Sold the Auto.

A decision of interest to motorists was rendered by Judge Denton in the county civil court at the city hall yesterday, when he awarded Ernest Constant his damages and the costs of the action in his suit against Mrs. Alice M. Foster and James A. Foster. The plaintiff had bought a Tudor car from the defendants, which had been represented as a 1912 model. He paid for it \$750, and Mr. Constant asked \$500 damages. His honor found that the defendants knew that the car had been built in 1911, and that it had several 1912 appliances, he held that the car was not of the year represented by the vendors.

BRIGHT PROSPECTS FOR NEW BRUNSWICK POTATO INDUSTRY.

(Special Correspondence.)—ST. JOHN, N.B., April 6.—With the production of over 10,000 bushels of potatoes, Premier Flemming anticipates a great development in the potato industry of the province. The completion of the John Valley Railway will open up and develop a large area of productive land, and the premier looks for a yield of 20,000,000 bushels of potatoes in a few years. An example of a crop grown by a Sunbury County farmer may be quoted. On seventeen acres of land he raised 1912 model potatoes, which netted on the wharf, directly from the harvest field, \$1.08 a barrel a return of \$2115.

QUEBEC WILL RELY ON ANCIENT LAWS

Fight With Federal Government Over Fisheries Jurisdiction Will Be Strenuous

QUEBEC, April 6.—Laws which are said to date from a period anterior even to the time when King John was forced by his barons to sign Magna Charta will, it is rumored, be invoked in the clash of jurisdiction over the fisheries question between the Province of Quebec and the Ottawa Government. The matter which is likely to affect the Maritime Provinces also has arisen out of the recent case between the attorney-general of British Columbia and the Dominion, whereby judgment given in December last it was established that the federal authorities have jurisdiction over everything in tidal waters. That is to say, the Quebec may lose her jurisdiction over the fisheries of the St. Lawrence and the Saguenay, and especially along the north shore, the fisheries of the Moisie, Natashquan and Godbout being likely to be affected. This will not apply to the salmon fishing, contrary to the impression which evidently has been created in certain quarters, but will probably apply to the netting rights, some of which have been leased to Americans. Even should Ottawa take over the fisheries, there is a Dominion law to the effect that netting cannot be carried on within so many hundred yards of a river mouth.
