

Allies Have Gained Ground in the Argonne District, and Germans Are in Precipitate Flight in Yser District.

Several Hundred Missing Af- Two Reserve Army Corps TURKS AND RUSSIANS FIGHT NEAR TREBIGOND, BLACK SEA

Czar Leaves for the Front After Commanding Army of Caucasus to March at Once Into Turkish Territory.

LONDON, Nov. 3.—On land the allies are having considerable success. The Germans have been obliged to abandon the left bank of the River Yser below Dixmude, while the allied armies have reoccupied all the crossings of the river in the flooded districts.

Great Britain, France and Russia have decided that they will respect the Mohammedan seats of worship and holy places in the Ottoman Empire and have given assurance of this fact throut Arabia and Egypt, as well as India. This move is said to be a diplomatic one, with the with the purpose of depriving the sultan of any excuse for declaring "Holy War."

GERMANS ABANDON THE YSER. This afternoon's official statement reads:

"On our left wing the enemy seems to have completely abandoned the left bank of the Yser down stream from Dixmude, and reconnaissances by troops of the allies undertaken on the bighways in the inundated regions were successful in reoccupying points of passage across the river without great difficulty.

"To the south of Dixmude, and in the direction of Ghelavet, our advance, was particularly percentible.

ALLIES RECOVER LOST GROUND.

We have maintained our positions at Amont, on the right bank or the river.

TURKEY PAUSES FOR AWHILE.

Turkey has paused in her contemplated raid on Egypt and the Suez Canal, deterred by the knowledge that England has assembled strong forces, well supplied with artillery, to meet the expected attack. The crippling of the cruiser Goeben, by the Sebastopol forts, has caused a temporary cessation of naval activity in the vicinity of the Black Sea. The Russian fleet early this afternoon was reported to be searching for the Goeben and the Breslau, said to have been seen in retreat toward the Bosphorus. The triple entente powers regard the apology of the grand vizier of Turkey as at least insufficient, especially as he was unable or unwilling to guarantee that the German officers in the sultan's army and navy would be dismissed. It is stated that the grand vizier lacks real authority, the cabinet being dominated by the war party, headed by Enver Bey.

TURKISH PORT SHELLED. TURKISH PORT SHELLED.

The following official statement was given out by the press bureau

"The Cruiser Minerva, when she arrived at Kalat El Akabah, at the head of the Gulf of Akabah, found it occupied by troops, one of whom was apparently a German officer.

"The Minerva shelled the fort. The Turks evacuated the town and a landing party from the British cruiser proceeded to destroy the fort, barracks, postoffice and stores. The enemy suffered some losses, but there were no casualties among the British.

From Delhi, India, comes the news that influential Mohammedans have adopted a resolution stating that Turkey has been decoyed by Germany into a breach of neutrality and declaring the British Government may count on the fidelity of Beluchistan Moshammedans.

News comes from Havre that the Germans near the coast are retreating to the eastward, abandoning their dead and wounded. The Belgian troops are moving on toward the Yser. They are discovering numerous evidences that the Germans are in precipitate flight in that vicinity.

Germany today began the assembling of six new army corps at Courtrai, Belgium, for an attack on the allies' line between Ypres and Arras, France. British aviators report large forces of Germans marching toward Ypres, which is expected to be the vortex of the battling for the next week. The Germans seem to have abandoned their attempt to cut their way thru to Saint Omer, southeast of Calais.

A battle of considerable magnitude is reported to be in progress near Trebizond, on the Black Sea, between the Turks and Russians.
