Mr. Ouellet: Mr. Speaker, I realize that it is almost six o'clock, but I have not yet received an assurance from the hon. member that he will co-operate and do his best to speed up the passage of this bill. I hope that we will get his support.

I would like to say something which will point out quite clearly the great performance of the current government in dealing with housing in Canada. A Gallup poll which was taken 11 years ago, in 1968, asked Canadians across the country whether they were satisfied or dissatisfied with the housing situation. That poll indicated at that time that 60 per cent of the people were satisfied, 34 per cent were dissatisfied and 6 per cent did not know.

At the end of 1978 another Gallup poll was taken and the same questions were asked. The results of that poll were: 85.5 per cent of Canadians were satisfied with the housing situation, and 13 per cent were dissatisfied. I think this clearly illustrates the good performance of the Liberal party in terms of housing.

I will continue my remarks when this debate continues. I would call it six o'clock.
