From a comparison of the above figures, the following important poare seen:—I. That, while in the Reformed Church the number of minist exceeds the number of congregations (which implies that some of the congrations have two or more pastors), in the other two churches compared, number of congregations is double that of the pastors, which implies overwof pastors. 2. That Infant Baptism is falling into disuse in the Reform Church, for we find, that with 200 ministers more than the Canada Presterian Church, it has baptized, of infants, 208 less than its Canadian is 3.
