YOW IT'S WAR BETWEEN

Montreal Citizens From the "Ould Sod" Indignant at Treatment on Catholic School Board.

MONTREAL, June 30 .- The Irisin catholics of the city have decided to take action to defeat if possible the plan of the French-Canadian majority in the city council to leave them without aldermanic representation on the Catholic School Board, which controls French and Irish Catholic schools alike.

Three aldermon compose the coun-cil's delegation on the board, and is cil's delegation on the board, and it has always been the custom for two of these to be French and one Irish. At a recent meeting of the council, however, the French-Canadian members, who are in the majority, voted to appoint a third French-Canadian to the position on the board left vacant by the expiration of the term of the Irish member, ex-Ald. Dan Gallery. They claimed that the other members of the board, elected by the religous authorities and by the provincial authorities, included Irish members, and therefore the Irish citizens would be over-represented if they were allowed their usual aldermanic delegates.

The Irish citizens are very indignant and a monster petition, worded very strongly, is being presented to the lieutenant-governor begging him to disregard the action of the city council's French majority and to make an appointment from amongst the Irish

It is freely stated that the French It is freely stated that the French-Canadian action is merely a reflection of the troubles of French-Canadians in Ontario and Maine, where, under Irish bishops, the French Catholics are protesting that they are not granted the rights and privileges which are rightly theirs in the matter of parophial schools and other questions.

ROOF COLLAPSED

Dead and Score Injured at Buffalo Pumping Station.

BUFFALO, June 30 .- Four men are dead, a score injured, and nine missing in the ruins, as the result of the total collapse about 9.30 o'clock this morning, of the new waterworks pumping station at the foot of Porter-avenue. When the disaster occurred thirty tilers and tinsmiths were at work on the roof and eight men were occupied on the ground floor making preparation for laying the new cement floor.

The roof of the new structure, which entailed an expenditure of more than a million dollars, fell in carrying the walls. It is thought that the weight of the roof was excessive, causing the
