The final revision of York Township assessment for the present year was held on Saturday last by His Honor Judge Moran.

Only four appeals were made to the court, with an assessment of nearly 6 millions, this speaks volumes for the ability of the municipal assessors, Mr. Conroy of Glendonville was granted a reduction of \$200; D. Pickering and J. Sale had their assessments confirmed, and the Mount Pleasant Cemetery appeal was held over for decision. The latter assessment opens up a knotty legal question as to the right of a municipality to assess buildings other than those actually needed for burial purposes. The residents of the Greenwood at Mount Pleasant Cemetery are not considered by the township to come within the statutory exemption, and the revising judge will give a decision in this interesting case in a few days.

The total tax of York Township for the year 1899 was \$85,000, and all but \$8000 has been brought into the municipal exchequer by the excellent services of Treasurer S. W. Armstrong. Considering the large amount of vacant property in the township, the large percentage collected is unusual.

The concert by the British-Canadian Band at Bond's Lake on Saturday drew off hundreds of pleasure-seekers. The handling of the large crowd drew credit to the management of the Metropolitan Hall.

The Deer Park Hotel was robbed early Saturday morning to the extent of about \$200. WARM WATER FOR PEOPLE.

Temperature at the Intake Fifty Feet Below the Surface on Saturday Was 66

OWING TO THE WARM WEATHER.

A Strange Assessment for a Sewer on Hickory Street—John Tierney Objects.

On Saturday morning the City Engineer's Department took the temperature of the city water at the base of supply, about half a mile out in the lake, and 50 feet below the surface. It registered 66 degrees, which is from 10 to 15 degrees warmer than the average. Engineer Fowles thinks that the cause is the unusual warm weather. Then also, he says, a wind blowing from the east haphazardly makes the water warmer, but if a west wind comes along it will cool the water in an hour or so. The water, as a rule, does not vary many degrees all the year round, because it is taken from a great depth.

PENALTY WORSE THAN DEATH

Will be Imposed on Brest, Who Shot and Killed King Humbert of Italy.

Rome, Aug. 25.—The punishment awaiting the Italian Brest is worse than death. He will inevitably be condemned to penal servitude, aggravated by 10 years of solitary confinement. A man condemned to this punishment, before being placed in his cell, is shut up in the "secret cell," about six feet long by three wide, and lighted only from a few inches square in the ceiling. She had quarrelled with her sister, 15 years old, and the older sister had struck her. She ran crying into the house, drank the poison, and expired two hours later.
