A SUICIDE AT ELEVEN.

Caroline Brewer Took Carbolic Acid Because Her Older Sister Struck Her.

New York, Aug. 25.—A child of 11, Caroline, the daughter of Frederick Brewer, of Verona, N. J., took her life yesterday with carbolic acid. She had quarrelled with her sister, 15 years old, and the older sister had struck her. She ran crying into the house, drank the poison, and expired two hours later.

WARM WATER FOR PEOPLE.

Temperature at the Intake Fifty Feet Below the Surface on Saturday Was 66

OWING TO THE WARM WEATHER.

A Strange Assessment for a Sewer on Hickory Street—John Tierney Objects.

On Saturday morning the City Engineer's Department took the temperature of the city water at the base of supply, about half a mile out in the lake, and 50 feet below the surface. It registered 66 degrees, which is from 10 to 15 degrees warmer than the average. Engineer Fowles thinks that the cause is the unusual warm weather. Then also, he says, a wind blowing from the east haphazardly makes the water warmer, but if a west wind comes along it will cool the water in an hour or so. The water, as a rule, does not vary many degrees all the year round, because it is taken from a great depth.

A Strange Assessment.

The Board of Control has received a communication from John Tierney, a property-owner on the west side of Hickory street, on whose lot the drain was constructed last autumn. In looking over his tax bill, which he claims is exorbitant, he finds that the whole of the east side of the street has been assessed for the drainage into the sewer as the west side, which has been assessed for the drainage into the street. He would be assessed, whether by accident or design he could not say. He has written to the City Engineer, requesting that the assessment be cancelled, and that the sewer be connected with the street on the east side. The engineer has refused to do so, and the Board of Control has ordered that the assessment be paid.

Company Declines to Repair.

City Engineer Rust has received a letter from the Warren-Schuyler Contracting Company, refusing to repair the holes in the pavement caused by the fire on Princes street. The damage will be in the neighborhood of \$1000, and the City Engineer's Department maintains that the contractor must repair the roads in repair, under an agreement entered into with the city.

City Hall Notes.

Mr. H. A. Dawson has written the Mayor, saying that he thinks it would be a mistake to have car tracks run up the centre of the new fruit market. It would be a mistake, he thinks, to have them run up Jarvis-street for trucking purposes. A building permit has been issued to J. J. Walsh for a detached building of semi-detached brick and stone dwellings on Princes-avenue, near King-street. The cost is \$12,000. Other permits were also issued to James H. Donohoe for a building of rough-cast dwellings, east side of Dundas-avenue, near Dundas-street, to cost \$3000; William Clark, for semi-detached brick dwellings, on the east side of Shaw-street, near Bloor-street, to cost \$2000.

PENALTY WORSE THAN DEATH.

Will Be Imposed on Brest, Who Shot and Killed King Humbert of Italy.

Rome, Aug. 25.—The punishment awaiting the Italian Brest is worse than death. He will inevitably be condemned to penal servitude, aggravated by 10 years of solitary confinement. A man condemned to this punishment, before being placed in his cell, is shut up in the "secret cell," about six feet long by three wide, and lighted only from a few inches square of a hole in the wall. A few inches square of a hole in the wall is all that is left of the world. The food is bread and water, passed through the grille. The prisoner is confined in absolute silence. If he breaks the rule he is subjected to other punishments, namely, the straight-jacket, iron and stocks. A prisoner who attempts his own life in any way is put into the straight-jacket, and kept in a sort of sack, in which he cannot move.

When the prisoner has suffered the punishment of the "secret cell" for a longer or shorter time, he is removed to the cell where he must remain for 10 years. His life depends on the construction of the whole prison. These cells are lighted only from the ceiling, and are generally about two yards square. The bed is the usual plank, and bread and water the food. In winter a single blanket is given, and in summer a single sheet. The only concession is a dose of medicine a few times a day. The extra punishment of the "cross" is terrible. The handcuffs are joined by chains to similar rings on the ceiling. The prisoner is seated on a bench the shape of an 'X' and his hands, still in iron, are fastened to the top of the "cross." The "straight" belt is a strong webbing one consisting of a band without a lid. At the foot the sufferer's feet are fastened in a kind of stocks, so that the legs cannot be moved. The prisoner is confined by the straight-jacket, stocks, and the "straight" belt. Unless by order of the governor the prisoner may not be moved, and his only life to feed him. This punishment is exercised only on some desperate rebel.

WAR SCARE IN FRANCE.

Moorish Troops are Massing in Great Numbers in Proximity to the Algerian Hinterland.
