TORIES OF EAST ALGOMA.

To Hold Convention—W. H. Price a
Possible Candidate.

Gore Bay, Aug. 13.—(Special.)—The
Conservative of the newly formed con-
stituency of East Algoma are at pre-
sent considering the advisability of call-
ing a convention to nominate a candi-
date for the coming Dominion election.
It is thought from the active work of
prominent Liberals in this section that
it is the intention of the government
to bring on the elections this fall.
If a convention is called it is quite
probable that W. H. Price of Gore Bay
will be nominated. A number of years
ago Mr. Price was offered the nomina-
tion against R. J. Lyon for the local
House, but refused. If he can be in-
duced to accept the nomination he could
not be beaten, notwithstanding the fact
that East Algoma has been carved up
in the Liberal interests.

BLAMED THE MOSQUITOES.

Philadelphus, Aug. 13.—Mosquito bites
have sent twelve persons to the Penin-
sula Hospital since August 1st. The
physicians there, while recognizing the
guilt of the mosquitoes, are inclined to
charge most of the victims with being
accessories after the fact, and blame
their condition to their having scratch-
ed and otherwise irritated the bites sub-
sequent to the departure of the mos-
quito. "Don't scratch a mosquito bite,"
says the doctors, "but ammonia on it."
That will allay the itching. Treating
with a mosquito bite is very like
to induce blood poisoning, especially
if the finger nails are not immaculate.

Chinese Rebels Victorious.

Hong Kong, Aug. 13.—The Chinese
imperial troops have been defeated by
rebels at Hwei Chou Fen, in the South-
ern Province of Kwang Tung. The
imperial reinforcements, consisting of 3000
German-drilled troops, have arrived at
Canton.

Laredo, Texas, Aug. 13.—In view of
the appearance of yellow fever at As-
toria, Texas, about seventy miles from
Laredo, the quarantine established here
has been made more rigorous by the
state authorities.

ADRIFF ON LAND AND SEA.

East Indian Steamer in Brooklyn
Streets—Small Boy's Adventure.

New York, Aug. 13.—Abdul Thadir,
lion hunter and elephant tamer, dressed
in Oriental clothes, came ashore from
the British ship Indramaya, from
Singapore to Brooklyn, to buy a pack-
age of cigarettes. The captain advised
him to take little money with him.
He obeyed, and lacking money, nearly
died in Brooklyn. The lion hunter
and his bearers, and persons could not un-
derstand him. For four days he starved
and slept in parks. Then he collapsed
and was taken to the hospital. For
days he was taken about the city try-
ing to find a person who could talk
to him. His ship had sailed away,
but with the aid of the British consul
the lion hunter started on the voyage
to his home country yesterday.

PICKED UP AT SEA.

New York, Aug. 13.—The Morgan
line steamer Eldorado, which arrived
today, had on board a 12-year-old
boy, who was found adrift in an open
boat about 100 miles off the coast of
Georgia on Aug. 10. He was naked
and almost dead from exposure. He,
with two other boys, was fishing out-
board of the steamer when the boat
broke adrift and they were un-
able to row it ashore. Two of the
boys swam for shore, but the third
was unable to swim so far, and re-
mained in the boat without food or
water until picked up by the Eldorado.
He says he was adrift for five days.

POPE LEO LEFT MILLIONS.

Seals of His Apartment Broken by the
Major Domo.

Rome, Aug. 13.—The Pope feel-
ing quite well today, took a long drive
and walk in the Vatican gardens, and
then received the Austrian Ambassa-
dor.
Mr. Cagiano, the Major Domo, ac-
companied by Cardinals Rampolla and
Moccini, opened the apartment of
Pope Leo this morning, finding the
seals put on at the time of the Pon-
tific's death. They found a consider-
able amount of money, it is stated,
several millions of francs, besides other
valuables.

SETTLERS SELLING TIMBER.

LOYAL TRUE BLUE PICNIC.

**Spent in Aid of the Or-
phanage of the Society.**

**Thomas Southworth, Provincial Di-
rector of Immigration and Commissioner
of Forestry, returned yesterday from a
trip thru New Ontario, and particu-
larly thru the Temiskaming district.**

There Mr. Southworth found the
roads built last year in good shape.
The Temiskaming district has settled
much more rapidly than was expected,
many having located as far inland as
Forty miles from the lake.

Settlers are not pushing farming
much, as they are paying more atten-
tion to their timber which yields them
a good profit. The regulation
gives permission to the settler who has
been on his land six months and has
two acres under cultivation to cut all
timber on his holding but pine. They
are taking advantage of this law, and
are selling their spruce, tamarack, balsam
and the pine cut in clearing for
good sums. Three large firms—E. B.
Gaddy of H. R. Booth of Ontario and
the Rideau Lumber Company of
Ottawa—paid \$175,000 to these set-
tlers for this year's crop of
pulpwood in the district, all but 3000 of
which was secured from the settlers.

The profusion of white firs in the
district is a great aid to the settlers,
whose wives and daughters may be seen
picking blueberries in large quantities
for preserving. Gooseberries, raspberries
and black currants are also to be found
growing wild, and in addition to being
used for food, they are sold for profit.
Mr. Southworth saw in one house a
store of preserves consisting of 143
quart jars.

LARD CORNER STONE.

The corner stone of the new brick
church of the Evangelical Association,
corner of Arthur and Streeby-streets,
was laid last night at 7 o'clock. The
service was in charge of Rev. I. M. Moyer,
pastor of the association, and the
ceremony was performed by Rev. J. G.
Litt of Waterloo, presiding elder of the
east district. Among those present
were Rev. J. H. Wagner of Berlin,
Clemens, Rev. L. H. Wagner of Ber-
lin, and Rev. M. T. Comfort of A. R.
Parrish. During the proceedings
Mr. Wagner gave a short sketch
of the history of the mission.

SERVIAN MINISTRY RESIGNS.

London, Aug. 13.—A despatch to the
Central News from Vienna says the
entire Servian Ministry has resigned
in consequence of the differences in
the personal relations between the
army officers, who participated in the
assassination of King Alexander and
Queen princess, those who took no
part in the murders.

FELL DOWN A HOIST.

Brantford, Ont., Aug. 13.—This fore-
noon, a man named Martin, working
at the erection of the Cockshutt new
buildings, fell from a hoist to the
ground, a distance of about 15 feet,
breaking his arm and receiving a severe
shaking up. He was removed to the
J. H. Stratford Hospital.

LAMP EXPLODED, HOUSE BURNED.

sion of a lamp, a house on Brown-street,
occupied by William Black, was badly
gutted by fire before he was rescued.
