and later president. His connection with general trade affairs has been lengthy and important. He became a member of the Montreal Board of Trade, in 1884, acted as vice-president, and was president during 1888. Among the other business and charitable organizations of which he is the official head are the Canadian Railway and Coal Co., the Labrador Co., Imperial Writing Machine Co., St. Denis Land Co., Montreal Investment Trust, Charity Organization Society, Victoria Order of Nurses and the Home for Incurable Invalids. Drummond is also vice-president and director of numerous other companies, and is a governor of the Royal Victoria Hospital and Montreal General Hospital.

The senator is notable also for his love of art, is a councillor of the Art Association of Montreal, and owns one of the finest galleries of paintings on the continent. Sport also claims a share of his attention, and he was elected president of the Canadian Golf Association in 1888.

He is a Conservative in politics and unsuccessfully contested Montreal West for the house of commons in the general election of 1872. In 1880 the Marquis of Lorne nominated him a senator of the Dominion.

The senator is a Presbyterian in religion, and was married first in 1857 to Helen, daughter of the late John Redpath, and second, in 1884, to Grace, daughter of the late George Hamilton, and daughter of the late A. Davidson Parker, Montreal.

Sir Robert Bannatyne Finlay, imperial attorney-general since 1900, and M. P. for the Inverness boroughs, was born in 1845, and is a son of Dr. William Finlay of Edinburgh. He was educated at Edinburgh Academy and University, is a graduate in medicine, and was called to the English bar in 1867. In politics he is a Liberal-Unionist and was appointed solicitor-general in 1898 and at the same time created Knight Bachelor.

Alfred Charles Harnsworth, principal proprietor of the London Daily Mail, The Evening News, and thirty odd other journals and magazines, the senior of four remarkable brothers, is the oldest son of the late Alfred Harnsworth, barrister. He was born on July 15, 1863, at Chappell, County Dublin, and made his initial start in weekly journalism on the staff of Titbits, the pioneer of a class of magazines which has attained a large measure of popularity. At an early age he commenced the publication of "Answers," which in a comparatively brief period became a successful property. Thence, with the assistance of his brothers, he launched out in various directions, and with few exceptions rapidly gaining popularity.

Thomas Barclay was born in Dunfermline, Scotland (the early home of Andrew Carnegie), in 1883 and was educated at the universities of London, Paris, Bonn and Jena. In 1876 he settled in Paris as correspondent of The Times, and resided in France for several years. He has been actively engaged in promoting a better understanding and closer relations between Great Britain and France, and was largely instrumental in paving the way for the conclusion of the recent Anglo-French arbitration treaty and subsequent arrangement of outstanding differences. The honor conferred is doubtless an acknowledgment of the services so rendered.

The Eight is one of the foremost British composers of the day, and since 1892 has issued many musical compositions displaying high artistic and technical skill. One of the most notable is the "Dream of Gerontius," produced in Düsseldorf in December, 1903, and revised at the Hochschule für Musik in May, 1902.

FAVOR 2-CENT RATE.

Brookville Cheese Board Objects to Increased Freight Charges.

Brookville, June 23.—(Special)—Brookville has the largest and most influential cheese board in Ontario, and at today's regular meeting an important resolution was discussed and passed, whereby the secretary was requested to ask the Railway Commission of Canada to hold a session in Brookville in the near future for the purpose of hearing grievances relative to freight and passenger rates on the G. T. R. and the C. P. R. with a view of getting relief.

Both these companies have seen fit to make a substantial advance in freight rates on cheese this summer. The carrying price list last year was 12 1/2 cents from Brookville to Montreal, which has been increased to 16 cents. The cheese men are up in arms against this alleged injustice, and a strong resolution asking the Railway Commission to investigate was introduced with a stirring speech by Mr. Redmond. The leading Canadian roads were roundly criticized for their treatment of the Canadian farmer in the way of passenger and freight rates.

Was the G. O. C. in the discharge of these duties to be interfered with by the minister of agriculture? asked Mr. Borden.
