Eleanor, daughter of Mr. Thomas London, Aug. 1. - Winston Spencer secretary of the colonial office, today outlined in the House of Commons the Government's proposal regarding the constitution to be granted to the Transvaal. The guiding principle, he said, would be not to make any difference between Briton and Boer, but to extend to both the fullest priviliges of British citizenship.

All males 21 years of age who had resided in the Transvaal for six months would be entitled to vote.

It is the intention to give the Rand 32 seats, Pretoria 6, Krugersdorp 1, and the rest of the Transvaal 30 seats. The members of parliament will be elected for five years and will be paid for their

For the first parliament there will be a second chamber of 15 members. nominated by the crown. During the first session arrangements will be made for an elective second chamber. The constitution will contain a clause abrogating the Chinese labor ordinance after a reasonable time. The recruiting of Chinese labor will cease entirely Nov. 15. An animated debate followed the


