Paris, Aug. 1.—After the magnificent success of the French and British in Belgium yest-erday, says the official statement issued today by the French war department, the Entente troops in a torrential, rainstorm consolidated the positions which they had captured. After several days of artillery preparation the Germans this morning attacked the positions on the left bank of the Meuse River, in the Verdun region, which the French had captured from them on July 17. Pekin, Aug. 1 .- The Cabinet is considering a declaration of war on Germany. Wang Tah Sch, minister of foreign affairs, has urged that China immediately follow Slam's example, and the Cabinet apparently is inclining strongly toward Joining the Entente Allies.
