The Road Hogs of Canada

The advent of the motor car in England gave rise to a new type, the road hog. The utter contempt for the convenience, happiness and rights of others that characterized some of the drivers and owners of the new and more speedy form of conveyance was so marked that the farmers, who suffered most by reckless motor speeding on the country roads, could find only one expressive phrase by which to proclaim their resentment. The term "ROAD HOG" stuck.

Later when Mr. Lloyd George was in want of blistering words by which to express British contempt for the barbarian methods of warfare adopted by the Germans, he fastened upon the Prussian for all time the label "The road hog of Europe." Nothing in the English tongue could express so forcibly and so accurately the contempt which Germany has brought upon herself by her arrogant and brutal disregard of the rights of other peoples. .

There are read hogs in every country. Every nation, however democratic, has to fight against the tyranny and autocratic pretensions that menace the liberties of the common people from within its own borders. Canada has its war lords and autocrats and Big Interests and haters of democracy who dispute the right of the people to rule, who lay grievous burdens on the backs of the harassed consumers and who make much riches out of the necessities and sufferings of the poorer members of the community. They are the road hogs of Canada. To a man these road hogs are to be found in the ranks of the Unionist party.

The whitewashing of Hon. Robert Rogers by a Borden commission which was a legal farce, was outdone by the premier when in his speech at Toronto last week he went out of his way to whitewash Sir Joseph Flavelle. Everyone knows that packers accumulate millions out of fractional profits, but the point which Sir Robert Borden evaded was the right claimed by Sir Joseph Flavelle to carry on war profiteering on as

big a scale as his credit and plant warranted. The Borden Government tacitly admits that Sir Joseph Flavelle had a moral squint when he applied ordinary market principles to war-time contracts. They have limited the future profits of the packers. But does any sane man believe that the public grievance against the packers is redressed by locking the stable door after the horse has been stolen? Sir Joseph Flavelle and the other road hogs of Canada are getting away with the huge profits that have been wrung out of the sweat and misery of the people, and no Government hand is stretched out to recover the excessive profits for the country to which they belong. Why? Because the road hogs of Canada own the Borden Government body and soul. Canada is under the heel of the Big Interests that put obstacles in the way of voluntary recruiting and which are opposed to anything that interferes with their profiteering.

Sir Joseph Flavelle is not the only war profiteer whose ungoldly gains should be investigated. The public would like to know what profits have been made during the past three years by the companies in which Hon. C. C. Ballantyne is financially interested. That Union Government is not trusted by its friends is evidenced by the well-grounded fear in Unionist circles that Borden will be snowed under at the polls if the Unionist voters are allowed to think about war profiteering and the part the Big Interests have played in bringing the Union Government into existence. The road hogs who are behind the Union Government are exploiting the public of Canada, and amassing huge profits at a time when members of the Government are imploring the people to make sacrifices on behalf of their country and the allied cause. Having amassed fortunes in war time these profiteers, in an age when money plays a sinister part in the government of the nation, are making a determined effort to control the reins of power. What hope is there for reconstruction on democratic lines in Canada from a Union Government that represents the Big Interests? 

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
