ONTARIO'S CROP OF SPRING WHEAT AND CORN IS EXCELLENT

Latter Better Than For Two Years.

OTHER CROPS LOOK WELL

Plowing Has Begun and Tractors Already Busy With Many Engagements.

The following is a summary of reports made by agricultural representatives to the Ontario department of agriculture:

Most of the barley and spring wheat and a considerable portion of the oats have been cut and stacked, and some threshed. More than usual of the thrashing has been done in the open, owing to the favorable weather prevailing.

Barley is turning out a first-class crop, both as to yield and quality. The yield will be well above the average, some fields going as high as 65 bushels to the acre.

Spring wheat has done so well that it is likely to become a more established crop with some who have been neglecting it. Marquis and goose have been the varieties mainly grown this season.

Oats also are a bumper crop, and will be considered over the average in yield per acre. Essex and Kenora reports some fields running as high as 50 to 90 bushels to the acre. There will also be a fair crop of excellent straw.

Buckwheat and the whole crop promise of being a fair crop.

There is a good prospect of a bumper crop of corn, and seed purposes have been largely covered. The vines of the later varieties were affected by the late frost, but the grain is well developed. Second growth of clover, which started in the spring, has been somewhat checked by drought, but recent rains have helped conditions.

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HONEY PLentiful, IS PROMISE OF FARMER

Says Bees Are Taking to the Clover Early.

Honey, this year, according to the statements of Dr. Angus, who is the owner and best bee farmer in London, will be well above the average. The people need not worry as to the amount of this product this winter. Mr. Angus today stated to The Advertiser that the clover this year had been cut, through some cause or another, and this stimulated growth of the bees to reach the blossom and the nectar of the plant. He reports that in all his years of bee farming he has never seen the bees take so freely to the clover, and he will make the supply of honey large this year. He says that from former years, Mr. Angus warns the farmers that if they have clover fields to save them and not plow them up to plant other crops, as he claims that they will make more money from the clover than they will from the other crops by the bees are taking to the clover this year.

MAMMOTH CORN A PUZZLE AT DUART

DUART, Aug. 23.—The Revere corn, a Southern production of which there is a very large acreage throughout the township, is becoming a cause of wonderment to the growers. The average height of the stalks is fully ten feet and still growing. The butt of the stalk is also of mammoth size, being by actual measurement, a good six inches around.

As a rule each stalk is now bearing two ears, the lowest of which is on the level with a man's head and the other much higher. There is much speculation as to how high stalks will be when fully grown, as to whether the ears will mature before snow falls, and as to how it is to be cut and stacked.

MONTREAL, Aug. 23.—Tomorrow is the last day of grace for men who have omitted to enlist under the military service act, and a feature of the situation here was the rush of men to join the colors, both at the 1st Depot Battalion at the Guy street barracks and at the 2nd Depot Battalion at the Peel street barracks. Today it was stated that well over a thousand defaulters had taken advantage of the amnesty during Thursday and Friday, and the number of men reporting shows no signs of letting up. It is expected that the rush will be increased tomorrow.
